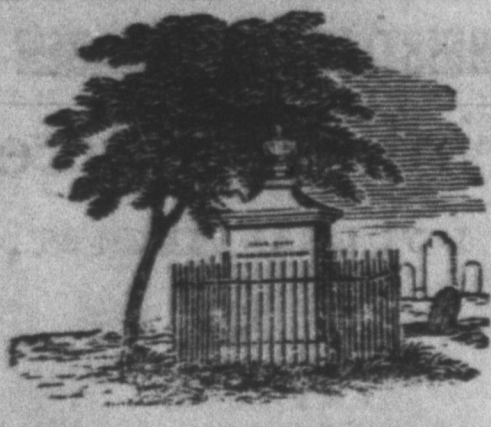

SEALED TENDERS, addressed to the undersigned endorsed "Tender for St. Lawrence Canals," will be received at this office until the arrival of the eastern and western mails on TUESDAY, the 13th day of November next, for the construction of a lock and regulating weir and the deepening and enlargement of the upper entrance of the Cornwall Canal. Also for the construction of a lock, to be together with the enlargement and deepening of the upper entrance of the Rapide Plat Canal, or middle division of the Williamsburg Canals. Tenders will also be received until TUESDAY, the 27th day of November next, for the extension of pierwork and deepening, &c., of the channel at the upper entrance of the Galops Canal. At Annapolis, St. John, N.B., and Portland Maine, 3 hours and 25 minutes LATER, and at St. John's, Newfoundland, 20 minutes EARLIER, than at Halifax. At Charlottetown, 2 hours 56 minutes LATER. A Yarmouth, 2 hours 20 minutes LATER.

FOR THE LENGTH OF THE DAY.—Add 12 hours to the time of the sun's setting, and from the sum subtract the time of rising, and the remainder is the length of the day. Subtract the time of the sun's setting, from 12 hours and to the remainder add the time of rising next morning.
