Miscellaneous.

The Legislature of Michigan has passed a Bill requiring that all pupils in the schools of that State shall be instructed in physiology and hygiene, with special reference to the effects of alcoholic drinks, stimulants and narcotics on the human system.

The English Channel Tunnel scheme has come to an end, at least for the present. The ten members of the joint committee of the two Houses of Parliament by a majority of six to four have decided against the undertaking. The promoters of the enterprise will probably make an attempt to proceed with the bill next year; and meanwhile, the agitation has had the effect of stimulating those who have the power to lessen the discomfort of the sea passage.

A deed of property lately made over to the United States, near Fort Davis, Texas, reads: 'To the United States or its successors.'
