The Roman Catholics are moving for a new College building here for the education of boys. At a private meet ing at the Glebe house on Monday evening over \$8,000 were subscribed to the object, and a committee appointed to solicit further contributions. It is pro posed that it shall be at Du ch Village, and is estimated to cost \$35 000 It will be remembered that the late Senator Power left a hundred thousand dollars to aid in setting up such a College. Hon. Mr. Butler has subscribed \$5,000, and others are giving liberally.

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It was the intention of the City Board of Works to commence cleaning the streets on Saturday last. They invite farmers to come aud take away the sweepings.

DALHOUSIE COLLEGE .- Mr. Munro has added to his former benefactions another one in the form of a Law Professorship. At a meeting of the Governors of Dalhousie College, held Wednesday, Prof. R. C. Weldon, Ph. D., of Mount Allison Wesleyan College, was appointed to the Chair of Law recently founded by Geo. Munro., Esq., of New York, and steps were taken towards the organization of a Law Faculty. G. M. Campbell, Esq., B.A., and J. S Trueman, Esq., B. A., were appointed to the Mathematical and Classical Tutorships, respectively. Messrs. Campbell and True man are both Graduates of Dalhousie

THE PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION is to be held at Truro on Monday the 24th of September. The Committee are at work making necessary preparations. Colonel Blair, M. P. P., is the Chairman and E. W. Hamilton the Secretary.

The Dominion Exhibition will be held this year at St. John, N. B., opening on the 2nd of October. A letter from J. L. Inches, E.q., to Dr. Lawson in the N. S. Journal of Agriculture says :- "The Dominion Government have promised the usual grant of \$5,000. thereby stamping it with the title of Dominion ; and, in consideration of this being the anni versary of the landing of the Loyalists, that Government promise an additional \$5,000, making \$10,000 from Ottawa; our Government give \$10,000, and the City of St. John \$5,000, in all at this time \$25,000, while it is probable other grants will yet be obtained. A second Crystal Palace, 200 feet long and three stories high, is being built. The Drill Shed will be used as a Machinery Hall, and additional structures will be put up for Agricultural Implements, &c. All this will give far more room for

exhibits than for any former Exhibition in the Maritime Provinces. Of course there will be, in addition to the above, ample accommodation for Stock.

The Roman Catholic and the Anglican Catholic churches are said to have been highly decorated on Easter Sunday last. At the Bishop's Chapel (Church of England) on Sunday evening there was a great crowd attracted by the announcement of the musical performances. The change of the Dominion High Commissionership in London has been a subject of some interest for weeks past. On Monday of last week in answer to a question put by Mr. Blake in the House of Commons Sir John said Sir A. T. Galt a protracted strike, have been operated had resigned as High Commissioner, but has been asked to hold office till the Spring.
