There was a public meeting in the Academy of Music on Sunday afternoon and every seat was filled, and good speeches were listened to from several gentlemen and popular Temperance workers from England, delegates to the Right Worshipful Grand Lodge of the World, which assembled in the Masonic Hall yesterday. It is rumored that M. H. Richey, Esq., M. P., will be the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia to succeed Governor Archibald. If so, of course there will shortly be a new election of a representative of Halifax Co., in the House of Common. Sir Charles Tupper has been in Halifax during the past week. He is accompanied with several official gentlemen, and the Warden J. F. Stairs, Esq., paid a visit to Dartmouth on Saturday last. It is said that their visit was in connection with locating the railway, which it is expected will shortly be commenced there. The Provincial Educational Association held their annual meeting in this city on the 11th and 12th of July. H. M. S. Northampton, flag ship on this station, arrived on Tuesday of last week from Bermuda, with Admiral Commerell on board. The city Inspector of Buildings reported to the Council last week that from January 1st, 1882, to 30th April, 1883, in the wooden district 29 new buildings had been erected, and 30 repaired and altered. In the brick district three new buildings had been erected, and 43 repaired and altered. The arbitration between the Local Government and the Halifax and Cape Breton Railway Company it is said has been awarded. The sum named is \$1,170,000 or \$80,000 less than the company demanded. The government it is said are to pay \$500,000 of this sum forthwith, the balance in four months, the company in the meantime to hold and operate the road "for and on behalf" of the government. A serious accident occurred on Tuesday of last week in McLaughlin's Tobacco Factory. One of the employees of the establishment, Benjamin King, a man of seventy-two years of age, accidentally caught his arm in a machine called the circular knife. Dr. Campbell was immediately summoned and conveyed the suffering man to the Hospital, where, an hour after the accident took place, the mangled arm was amputated right below the elbow. Mr. D. L. Chubbuck, the evangelist, was married by the Rev. D. A. Steele, at Amherst on Thursday last, to Miss Maud McCully, eldest daughter of the late Mr. Robert McCully. The happy pair left for St. John, N. B., from which place they expect to proceed to Jacksonville, N. B. where Mr. C. will resume his evangelistic work. A large number of Nova Scotians—male and female—are out of employment in Boston, who would be glad to work almost at any wages. Important gold lead discoveries are reported from Montagu and Chezzetcook. The Nova Scotia Brigade Camp will this year be held at Pictou commencing on July 25th. The Amherst Boot and Shoe Company's sales for the past year exceeded \$145,000. A dividend of 10 per cent. was declared and a sum about equal to the dividend reserved. An effort is being made to increase the endowment fund of Kings College, and Windsor has led off with a subscription list of \$1000. The Richmond Sugar Refinery has one hundred and thirty hands employed in the refinery and coopers departments. Last month some thirteen thousand barrels were manufactured, the greater portion of which has been disposed of. The large stock on hand in the Spring has been nearly all worked off. The demand is very brisk, and all the sugar that the Refinery can turn out is largely bought up. The Civil Service examination in this city commenced yesterday. Mr. J. Parsons, B. A., is appointed by the government to conduct the examinations. The Halifax grain Elevator is pronounced by Mr. McLaughlin of Stratford, Ont., who recently shipped grain from it, the most complete and perfect he had ever visited—and he has seen all the larger ones both in the United States and Canada. He is quite sanguine of the ultimate success of the elevator, and expressed a very decided opinion that before long another of equal, if not larger capacity, than the present one would be required. He appeared to think there was only one fault to be found with the elevator, and that was that its capacity—250,000 bushels—was not large enough for the grain trade which he is sure will before long come to Halifax. Yarmouth held its 122nd anniversary on Saturday last. A valuable chestnut mare and a saddle and bridle were stolen from the stable of Mr. Maynard Cogswell, at Morristown, Aylesford, on Saturday night. Three thousand one hundred and seventy-five quintals of codfish were landed at Lunenburg last week by eleven of the Bank fleet of that port. Forty tons of the gold producing slate of the Cheggogin mines have been assayed during the past month with satisfactory results, and the property is likely to pass into the hands of an American company. A company has commenced operations in Annapolis in the way of manufacturing bricks, tiles and pottery. Dominion of Canada. In the Methodist Conference at Montreal the question of Union was under discussion for three days, at the close of which, on Wednesday last, they came to a division when there appeared 66 for Union, and 51 against. It was expected that this week the Canada Pacific Railway would operate six hundred miles of road west of Winnipeg, and to Thunder Bay, four hundred and thirty-five miles east besides the subsidiary lines. Some trouble is reported at the end of the track now laid by strikes of railway employes. The Indians are also troublesome, and several horses have been stolen. Inspector Steele left Regina with thirty mounted police for the scene of the trouble. The body of a man found drowned in Red River, at Winnipeg, has been identified as Capt. Allen, an Englishman, who recently arrived from Nova Scotia. A mystery surrounds his disappearance. The body was buried without an inquest being held. On Wednesday last Mrs. McGinnis, widow of Capt. McGinnis, who was killed on the P. E. Island Railway, received £500 sterling exchange compensation for her loss. This is in addition to \$400 paid some time ago. Political circles are being somewhat excited by the charges of the Toronto Globe against members of the government of dishonest practices; a prosecution of the Globe is threatened unless the scandal is withdrawn. The financial affairs of the Province of Manitoba reported on Wednesday last are causing anxiety. The receipts from all sources, including Dominion subsidy, amounted to \$259,635. Expenditure for same period, \$325,529, leaving a deficiency of \$65,956. About 500 British immigrants arrived in Montreal on Friday last. A despatch from Victoria British Columbia, says forty miles of the Canada Pacific Railway will be completed July 1st. This portion runs through the Fraser Canon. The first train will run over it July 1st. The road from Port Moody to Boston Bar is expected to be completed by January 1st. On Wednesday one steamer brought 500 immigrants, who are anxiously awaiting the opening of the Island lands by proclamation. A few families are squatting in advance of the proclamation. The Chinese business men of Victoria B. C., have resolved to advise the Chinese Government to allow no more emigration to British Columbia at present. At a meeting held this week it was stated that two thousand Chinese laborers had died during the last year. The mortality was attributed to exposure, accident and the sudden change in diet. An Order in Council has been passed admitting silver and German silver in sheets for manufacturing purposes free of customs duties. A special agent belonging to the Customs Department has, within the past few days, seized upwards of six thousand dollars worth of goods for under-valuation, in Cornwall and Brockville. Mr. Beggan, an immigration agent, who has just returned from the old country, says the emigration from the British Isles to Canada this year is much greater than ever before, and of a superior class.
