S. and in the year 1820, purchased a farm in this wilderness valley in the close vicinity of the present thriving village of Berwick, where he outlived all his early co-temporaries, and his death records the departure to the "better country" one of the first and the last of the surviving pioneer fathers of this place. At the time of his settlement here only a dense forest graced the surrounding hills and valleys. Like others, here in the "forest primeval," he enjoyed but few privileges, and experienced toil and hardships and privations now altogether unknown. By integrity and industry he accumulated the social and religious privileges, and the ease of a more advanced age; and was justly esteemed by all who knew him. Though he never united with any church he had evidently experienced the saving grace of God in his heart, and was esteemed as a christian, and one whom the church would gladly have welcomed as a member, having been received more than once as a candidate for baptism. The high estimation in which he held religion and all moral excellence together with a profound sense of his own unworthiness kept him from uniting fully with the church. For a number of years he held family worship, and not till venerable age and disease were upon him did he commit the duties of the family altar to his son who cared for him in his closing days. Through life he was a constant worshiper and took delight in the services of the sanctuary. Like the last lone fallen tree that overlooked and graced the landscape he is with the living no more, but has entered the better country where the weary are at rest. His companion, in her weakness and suffering, lingers on the threshold, ready to depart. D. O. PARKER.

THE TIDES.—The column of the Moon's Southings gives the time of high water at

Parro, Cornwallis, Horton, Hantsport, Windsor, Newport, and Truro.

High water at Pictou and Cape Tormentine, 2 hours and 11 minutes LATER than at Halifax. At Annapolis, St. John, N. B., and Portland, Maine, 3 hours and 25 minutes LATER, and at St. John's, Newfoundland, 20 minutes EARLIER, than at Halifax.

At Charlottetown, 2 hours 53 minutes LATER. At Westport, 2 hours 54 minutes LATER. At Yarmouth, 2 hours 20 minutes LATER.

FOR THE LENGTH OF THE DAY.—Add 12 hours to the time of the sun's setting, and from the sum subtract the time of rising.

FOR THE LENGTH OF THE NIGHT.—Subtract the time of the sun's setting, from 12 hours to the remainder add the time of rising next morning.
