I have been engaged as Colporteur about seven years, but have only laboured under the direction of the Society for one year. The labour of the past year has been the most pleasant because the books furnished by the Society are cheaper than those obtained from other sources and the people are very generally in sympathy with the Society's efforts and ready to patronize its agents.

During the year I heve [traversed the greater portion of Colchester a well as a portion of Halifax County. Although the ground I have worked is generally pretty well cultivated, spiritually. I have found many neglected corners. In a back settlement of E-I found more than one family that had not been visited by a minister for three years. Near T----. Several families for five or six years had been similarly neglected. The tears of gratitude that followed my efforts on their behalf testified to their appreciation of my visit and encouraged me to hope that the good seed sown would bring forth fruit to the glory of God.



Total grants by the Society, including those from Depot, more than \$16,000 worth. Time served by the Colporteurs equals that of one man for 142 years. Labrador, Newfoundland, Cape Breton, P. E. Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and a portion of Quebec have been explored. There have been found 1,525 lamilies without God's Word ; 2,582 families with no other religious book ; and 2,545 families who habitually neglect attending any place of worship The 26 Colporteurs employed in 1882 performed labor equal to that of one man for  $12\frac{1}{4}$  years; found 205 Protestant families without Bibles, 279 with no other religious books, and 378 families who never enter the House of God.
