Rev. H. A. Robertson, Presbyterian Missionary from the South Sea Islands. has been spending the past week in Halifax, and besides addressing public meetings, has exhibited a number of curiosities which he brought home with him. They consist of heathen idols, made of the trunk of a tree carved to represent the rude image of a man with feathers stuck on the head for hair; an extensive lot of island grass as used for native dresses and all other purposes, also made into matting by the yard or into hats, bonnets, etc.; bows, arrows, spears, clubs and battles axes and instruments of heathen warfare in all kinds and variety, small and great, some rude and others exquisitely carved and exhibiting wonderful ingenuity in their workmanship; models of boats and canoes of the different styles, including those with outriggers to prevent their upsetting, and dug outs; shells from the shores, of splendid appearance and beautifully tinted, ranging in size from that of a walnut to a small-sized barrel; a specimen of an immense sacred stone-ring of Erromanga, believed by some to be a god; sandal wood and samples of all the other principal woods grown on the islands, odorous, spicy and otherwise; pillows of the softest and lightest imaginable kind, made from the down of the fern trees which, in the Fiji Islands, is called "pulu,"-it comes a little more expensive than feathers; and very many other etceteras, including seeds and stones and plants and specimens of native writings something after the Chinese style; also some views of portions of the islands, framed. In the collection is the axe with which Narimpoa killed Rev. James Douglas Gordon, the missionary, March 7th, 1872, just before Mr. Robertson went to his work It is a most murderous-looking tomahawk with a heavy iron-wood handle. The articles are all for presentation to the college museums throughout the Dominion, and will be forwarded immediately.

They will be on exhibition to-morrow at the Y. M. C. A. Room.

The Windsor Mail says: "It is clear that the Canada Temperance Act is a farce. It has been tried and found wanting, and the sooner the temperance people repeal it and get back our old Provincial Act, the better."

George Redden, formerly of Windsor, was killed by a horse railway accident at Eureka, California, on the 19th ult.

On Friday afternoon there were three explosions at the Acadia Powder Mills. at Waverly, about nine miles from Halifax, which resulted in the death of Henry McEwan, who has been in the employ of the company for 10 years. Rawley Smith and Charles Miller were near by and escaped with a few bruises. The explosions commenced in No. 1 mill, which was blown to atoms; in a moment the storehouse adjoining was blown up-it contained a quantity of powder; then there was a third report, and the mixing mill (in which was the most valuable machinery) was also destroyed. McEwan was in the first building when it went up, and was found with his head crushed in, legs broken, and otherwise terribly mangled. Smith's injuries were serious, and he was brought to the Hospital. McEwan was aged 45. and left a wife and eight children. An inquest was held by Coroner Lingley, of Waverly, and a verdict rendered of "death by accidental explosion of the powder mill, the cause being unknown." McEwan was buried on Sunday at the Camp Hill Cemetery. By some misunderstanding there was no clergyman at the interment and the company of mourners and Freemasons, of which order he was a member, had to wait and send for Rev. Mr. MacArthur who came and conducted the solemn service.
