For the Christian Messenger. British Columbia for Christ.

It is with hearty satisfaction and deep gratitude that I acknowledge the continued interest in British Columbia manifested by the brethren of the Maritime Provinces. Since my last letter of August 3rd, I have received many donations to this cause so dear to my heart, so that the sum of money previously acknowledged has been largely augmented. Especially cheering is the fact that these offerings have been given, "not grudgingly, or of necessity," but with a glad heart and a kind word. When I see among the donations the "widow's mite," the gift of the fatherless, the hard-earned savings of the laborer, and the offerings of little children, I feel assured that this work is of God and none can hinder it. I desire here to make particular mention of the kindly interest shown by our Maritime Home Mission Board, who have given both public and private endorsement and assistance in the undertaking. Of the monies previously acknowledged, \$117.28 was given through this Board, and it is my fervent desire and expectation that in the near future there may be a closer and organic union of East and West in all missionary enterprises. This is also the wish of our American Brethren. Although embarrassed by debt (nearly \$60,000.00), and while enlarging the sphere of operations within their own borders, they have with great magnanimity extended their efforts to Canadian territory. To the Victoria field alone their donations will amount to nearly \$900.00 this year. This they do for the sole unselfish object of holding this important territory until the Canadian Baptists recognize their duty and occupy and control the field for themselves. In this connection, I quote the words of Rev. Dr. Morehouse, Cor. Secretary of the American Baptist Home Misionary Society, written to me a few days ago. "I trust,"-he remarks, "that speedily the missionary organization of our Canadian brethren may be enlarged in its scope, so as to take in work in the North West which now receives

We are now en route to our distant field of labor and hope in God's kind providence soon to reach Victoria. We request from the dear brethren in the East a continuance of sympathy and of prayer to our heavenly Father that in this arduous and responsible enterprise His grace may be sufficient for us.
