An explosion occurred at Hanoi on the 28th ult., destroying two batteries of French artillery. One man was killed and three others injured.

Two thousand Annamites attacked a French post which was held by fifty marines. After several hours of hard fighting the enemy retired with a loss of one hundred killed and wounded.

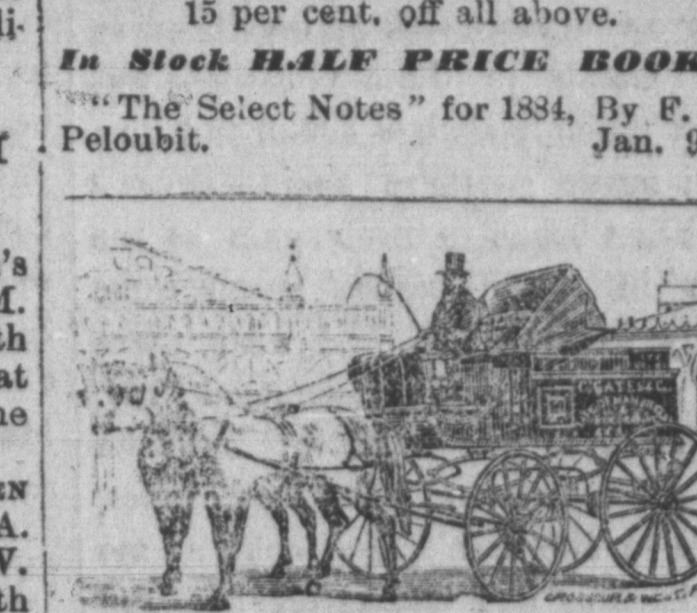
