

The Scott Act campaign is being actively carried on in Ontario. County towns are likely to go against the measure.

The proceedings of the Manitoba Legislature are attracting much attention. The report of the delegation to Ottawa is not regarded as satisfactory.

Much uneasiness exists from the attitude of the Indians in the West. At Maple Creek, on Saturday, the 24th ult., they stole five mules from Jules Queenell in open day light.

The members of the Quebec Legislature have increased their own sessional pay from \$500 to \$700. A game of grab.

During the month of May the Canada Pacific railway syndicate sold 65,000 acres of Northwest land. Last May only 1,700 acres were sold, while the sales of the whole year only aggregated 33,000.

News of the World.

The marriage of Princess Elizabeth of Hesse to Prince Leopold, hereditary prince to the throne, took place on the 26th ult.

At Dover on Wednesday evening, at the time of the landing of the Duke of Cambridge, the movements of a foreigner was such as to arouse suspicion.

An explosion of dynamite occurred outside the detective office in Scotland Yard on Friday evening. At St. James' Theatre, a hundred yards distant, the explosion sounded like two claps of thunder.

It is unknown whether it was of incendiary origin. So far as known up to noon thirteen persons were more or less injured.

In the House of Commons on Tuesday last, Mr. Gladstone declared that the Egyptian conference would be limited to the discussion of the financial situation.

Sir Henry Gordon on Monday said that the latest news from Gen. Gordon was to the effect that he had no fears of personal safety.

Seven of the prisoners in the Tubercular conspiracy were on Wednesday committed on charges of treason, felony, and conspiracy to murder.

On Wednesday last the Anchor Line steamer Furnessia sailed from London for New York with five hundred state aided emigrants on board.

News reached Cairo on Wednesday, that a new black False Prophet has appeared before Darfour and defeated El Mahdi's troops.

The new Mahdi, who is stated to have appeared in the Sudan, claims the power of becoming invisible at will.

A telegram from Cairo says that rebels fled from Suakim for two hours on Wednesday. The forts and ships responded with twelve guns.

A Catholic bishop of the Sudan has just arrived at Cairo from the south. He reports that seven Italian priests and four Sisters of Mercy have been massacred at El Obeid.

Spain has suffered much from floods in the South Eastern part of the country. Four hundred and nine dwellings have been destroyed and 514 injured.

Great indignation is expressed at the action of the government in preventing the friends of the imprisoned journalists from meeting to better their condition.

South Africa advises state that the Boers have crowned Cetewayo's son, Dinizulu, king of Zululand.

At Phumpenk, the capital of Cambodia, the whole quarter outside of the French concession has been destroyed by fire.

A cold wave passed over the New England States on Thursday night last and did great damage in the strawberry district around Taunton.

In northern New Hampshire several inches of snow fell. Around Norwich, Conn., ice a quarter of an inch thick formed and all crops which can be killed by cold are ruined.

At Albany, N. Y., ice half an inch thick formed. Nearly all vegetables and small fruits were destroyed.

A despatch from Baton Rouge to the Picayune, says discouraging accounts of the situation in Red River Valley have been received.

J. O. P. Burnside, disbursing clerk of the Post Office Department at Washington, has been arrested on the charge of having embezzled \$45,000.

The Belmont coal mines in Northern Alabama suspended on Wednesday on account of the Grant & Ward failure.

President Bruen, of the Hot Springs National Bank, and Mrs. Steele are still in custody, and will remain here until an officer comes from Hot Springs for them.

The affairs of the Penn Bank are in a very muddled condition, and the bank is regarded as being completely gutted.

Kaup's Tunnel, on the South Pennsylvania Railroad, was the scene of a terrible accident, on Thursday, by which nine men were instantly killed.

The rolling mills of Cincinnati were all shut down on Saturday night throwing 3,000 men out of employment.

One of the leading farmers of Dutchess County, N. Y. states that the damage in that county alone by frost will reach nearly \$1,000,000.

A destructive flood occurred in Colorado and Nebraska on Thursday last caused by a cloud burst which occurred at a point near the head of Cheyenne Indian trail canyon.

A cloud burst near Visalia, Cal., on Saturday night and swept away the house of Peter Stewart and all the inmates, consisting of Stewart, his wife, mother, and two children.

The Indians in Dakota are threatening to rise at Turtle Mountain near Grand Forks. Blackfeet and Sioux are leaving the Upper Missouri for the mountains and Canadian Indians are coming over.
