

We have received collections from nearly all bodies of Christians in Nova Scotia, and from some in P. E. Island and New Brunswick. About One Hundred babes have been adopted from our Home into respectable Christian families. Hundreds of babes and scores of mothers have been cared for; and much has been done to put a stop to the odious and cruel practice of Baby farming. Our Home having been nearly destroyed by fire last Spring, we have renewed and greatly improved the building, thus incurring heavy expense. Our income should not be short of Three Thousand Dollars a year.
