A new Canadian Loan of five million pounds has been issued in London. The interest is 34 per cent., and the minimum price of it is 91.

In the Quebec Assembly the efforts to prevent enquiry into the charges against Judge Mousseau resulted on Thursday in the Opposition leader bringing in a bill which was immediately put through all its stages, constituting the members of the actual committee of enquiry, special commissioners, with full power to continue the investigation after prorogation, which took place in the afternoon, after sitting eleven weeks.

The principal evidence against ex-Premier Mousseau is expected to come from the party in possession of the alleged compromising correspondence was found in a bureau purchased at a judicial sale. The happy possessor of these precious documents is said to claim \$6,000 for their delivery.

The Opposition had a great pic-nic at Newmarket on Wednesday last, and the Hon. Mr. Blake made a great political speech on the situation.

On Wednesday an effort was made to bring in a measure for the consolidation of their Colleges, but was deferred and resumed on Friday, when a motion for a committee to consider the possibility of the union of the several theological colleges was ultimately carried.

A memorial from the Presbytery of Brockville and an overture from the Synod of Toronto and Kingston recommended the organization of a denominational publishing house. It was moved that the whole question be committed to a committee to examine and report upon next year, which was carried.

The Presbyterian body are experiencing difficulty from the attitude assumed on the matter of marriage with a deceased wifes sister. It is evident that they cannot resist the pressure against such prohibition and they therefore decided that the Scriptures do not warrant the prohibition of the Confession of Faith, that no dicipline can be visited in such cases. The matter is therefore to be sent down to Presbyteries, for full consideration, and the church is to correspond with the parent church to secure unanimity of action.

Forty five new churches and twenty new manses were built during the year. The total income is \$1,454,000, an increase of fifty per cent. in nine years.

On Friday, the Assembly received a deputation from the Diocesan Synod of Toronto, the Arch Deacon of York conveyed the cordial greetings of the Synod. Edward Blake, M. P., by authority of the Diocesan Synod, asked the Assembly to co-operate in seeking to secure religious instruction in the common schools. The overture on the evils in party politics, was supported by Messrs. Armstrong and Moore. It recommended the cultivation of truth. charity and a more judical spirit in the transaction of public business.
