Deaths.

William Graves departed this life on Sabbath morning, Dec. 7th, 1884, in the 69th year of his age. He was born in Chester in 1815 and was married to Catherine Fader in 1836. Soon after they moved to St. Margarets Bay where the greater part of their married life was spent. Here their children were born, except the youngest—and here both husband and wife found the Saviour precious to their souls. Mrs. Graves was the first to own her divine Redeemer, experiencing much opposition from her husband, but she never swerved from her purpose and cheerfully confessed her faith in the Lord Jesus Christ in baptism. Her prompt obedience—faithful testimony and consistent walk so impressed the mind of her husband with the reality of the religion of Jesus that he became deeply concerned for the welfare of his soul. This he kept to himself—often going apart to pray. His heart was rebellious, his will stubborn—but God's grace is adapted to every sinner's case and it was not long before he was made "willing in the day of His power." The will was subdued and the heart melted within him—and he rejoiced in a Saviour's love. He was baptized at Black Point by the Rev. T. H. Porter, Senr., whose memory is revered by a great number around the shores of this beautiful Bay. Five years afterward the family moved into the city of Halifax, and he united with the North Baptist Church with whose fellowship he continued until his death.
