A telegram from Cairo on Wednesday said the English troops are advancing all along the Nile. The Staffordshire regiment has gone from Wady-Halfa to Dongola in boats.

The British Government has decided to limit the increased expenditure on the navy during the coming financial year to £1,200,000.

The Salvation Army's Trade Mark.—The Official Trade Mark Journal, London, in its issue of August 20, publishes an application from William Booth, General of the Salvation Army and Minister of the Gospel, to be registered, as the proprietor of a trade mark, in which the design of a cross and crown and the words "blood and fire" form the principal part.

At Goderich, Ont., considerable excitement was caused on Wednesday last by the discovery that the court house had been broken into on Sunday night and three Scott act ballot boxes awaiting an official count stolen.

At Orangeville, also on Sunday night some parties broke into the office of the returning officer and stole five of the ballot boxes containing the returns of the vote on the Scott act in Dufferin.

On Thursday last a fearful storm along the lower St. Lawrence, accompanied by high tides, has washed away the Inter-colonial track between Rimouski and Bic, inundated fields, isolated the signal station and lighthouse at Father Point, carried away eighteen houses and undermined others.

It is mentioned as a curious fact by the Baptist Weekly that no Jew can be found tending bar in New York City, where there are 60,000 members of that faith.

A GAME of football was played on Saturday last between the club of the Windsor Collegiate school and that of Horton Collegiate Academy, on the grounds of the latter. The Horton Academy boys were the victors.

JAPAN.—Miss Whitman writes the Helping Hand from Tokio: "The first Sabbath in August two were baptized. It seems as though more were listening to the preaching on Sundays. Wednesday night more than usual stopped after the service to ask questions of Toryama San. It is very encouraging to have strangers come in to the meetings, or to see them stand at the door and listen attentively through almost an entire sermon. I hope the Spirit will bless the seed sown in this way. Almost every one is ready to take tracts. If they see us giving them away, they will come running from every side asking for one. I suppose they would be just as glad to receive anything they could read, and do not at all put it down to their eagerness for the Gospel. Still the seed is scattered in this way.

The Japanese government is at present considering whether to acknowledge Christianity as one of the religions of the country, as Shintoism and Buddhism are recognized, and officers have been sent to every preaching place to inquire about Christianity and its effect upon the moral character of its followers. The officers came to both of our preaching places, and Toryama San gave the names of all the churches. The Mikado is being taught of Christianity by one of the ministers; but as the teacher is not himself a believer, he cannot teach from the heart. But even that teaching can be blessed.
