Rev. W. H. Warren spoke earnestly and well on " The Christian Church a great Missionary Society." Every church should be always using its endeavours to give the gospel to those living around them. It ceases to be a Christian Church when it ceases to be a Missionary Society. The stronger churches should aid the weaker ones in proclaiming the gospel. Our relation is that of members of the same family, and mutual aid should be freely given. Home Missions should be well sustained as a most important means of doing good.

Rev. George Churchill and Mrs. Churchill by request sung two Telugu hymns, one of these being a paraphrase of the Lord's Prayer in that language.

Rev. Dr. Day's address was on "Our duty to the heathen." Our Lord says "Go," and it is for us to ebey without question, but believing that he will sustain those who carry out his injunctions. Whilst we have heathen at home they are not such heathen as are those in lands of darkness and idolatry.
