But it would be a cynical view of life which represented this to be the rule. If it does not all come back in money, that is no sign that it is wasted. If the money that you expend on your boy's education makes a man of him, fits him to live a happy and a useful life, enlarges the horizon of his mind, opens to him the resources of nature and of literature, enables him to commune with the great minds of the race, and to think God's thoughts after him-it is money well invested, even if it does not result in making of him a Gould or a Vanderbilt. Money that you expend on clothes, and luxuries and diversions -on giving children what are sometimes called social advantages, may not always be wisely expended; but everything that you can do with money toward building up their manhood or their womanhood, toward enlarging their mental or their moral powers is money well expended .- Washington




