News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK

At Moncton Tuesday a meeting of citizens and City Council appointed Messrs. C. W. Robinson, Joshua Peters, A. H. Ryan, Ald. Read and others to discuss with Manager Hoyt, of the Smelter Company, the possibility of coming to Moncton. The city offer a free site, free water and exemption from taxation, besides holding out inducements in freight.

A. H. Jones has offered to donate four acres of land free to any industry locating in Moncton and employing 30 hands or up wards.

A dynamite explosion at Dipper Harbor a few days ago badly injured John and Daniel Murray. The former had his face cut and his nose split open. One of Daniel Murray's hands was lacerated.

Tuesday afternoon of last week at North River station, W. Co., during the temporary absence from the house of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony McHale, their son, a deaf and dumb lad, got down the gun and was pointing it at his little sister aged five years, in play. Suddenly the heavy charge exploded, tearing off the top of the little girl's head killing her instantly.

A wreck followed by death and destruction, occurred in the Bay of Fundy Wednesday evening. The three-masted schooner Lena Pickup was dashed to pieces on the rocks at Black River near St. John. One man was drowned and the captain and one of his crew had a serious time, undergoing severe hardships and injuries.

The crew of the wrecked vessel arrived in St. John Thursday afternoon and were taken care of at the Seaman's Mission. The master of the Lena Pickup is Captain William Mattson, of Lunenburg, N. S. The vessel was bound for Port Grenville, to load for New York. She belonged to Capt. S. B. Robbins Yarmouth, who had last bought her.

Diphtheria is prevalent at Newcastle South and Blackville.

The reconstruction of the Stanley and Cross Creek Railway will be soon completed; men are now putting down the rails.

Two natives of Kent county, N. B., will have seats in the newly-elected British parliament. Bonar Law, son of James Law, for many years Presbyterian minister in Kingston, Kent county, N. B., and Mr. Keswick, member of S. B. Rev. who was also born in Kent county, N. B.

Frank McManiman, charged with entering the stores of J. S. Neill and M. Fickler & Co., in this city was sent up for trial.

J. A. McArthur, superintendent of the government chicken fattening farm at Sussex has killed and shipped to England the first lot of birds fattened this season. There were 226 chickens, the lot totalling 1,150 pounds. They had been in Mr. McArthur's hands for six weeks.

Gao. A. Schofield manager of the Bank of New Brunswick, at St. John died on Sunday last.

The saw mill and grist mill belonging to the Alexander Gibson Company of Marysville were burned at an early hour Monday morning. The hotel also caught fire but little damage was done.

A portion of the wall of the Theatre Francaise, in course of construction at Montreal, collapsed in the gale on Wednesday and in its fall demolished a small house. The ruins caught fire and an invalid occupant was so badly burned that he died on the way to the hospital.

The new steamer Fife, one of Mr. Reid's fleet of eight Newfoundland mail boats running in coastal service, was lost in the Strait of Belleisle Sunday during a dense fog. The vessel was worth \$100,000. No lives were lost.

A special from Seven Islands, North Shore, reports the complete wreck of the coasting steamer S. Olaf. Captain Lemsisture, of Quebec. It is supposed all on board were lost. One body that of a woman, with a mail bag and some other articles, have so far been recovered. Seven Islands is on the north shore in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, about 300 miles below Quebec.

Searching parties found part of the bow of the vessel and boiler on rocky flat close to Boule island, and a small portion of the vessel and cargo in the same neighborhood. The body found was identified as that of Miss M. R. Page, Thunder river.

The following is the list of other passengers known to have been on the ill-fated vessel; Napoleon Beaudin, St. John's river; Jerome Chintic, Joseph B. Con, Clarence Bond, Michael Miller Sneldeke; Louise Gagnon, Pentecost. There is no hope whatever that anyone escaped. So far as is known 35 lives were lost. The St. Olaf was valued at over \$40,000 and insured for about half her value.

The new parliament will be called to meet either the last week in January or the first week in February. All public departments have been notified to push their annual reports. The session is expected to be a short one.

It is expected that fifty thousand turkeys will be shipped from Toronto to England for the Christmas trade.

CANADIAN ELECTRICS.—The Dominion Statistician has compiled some interesting figures about the electric railways of Canada. During the year ended December 31, 1899, the 612 miles of track were so used that the total number of miles run by cars was 20,646,847.

The number of passengers carried was over 104,000,000 namely, 104,033,659. This is equal to carrying every man, woman and child in the Dominion 20 times. The mileage run and the passengers carried show that for each mile run the electric carried 3 1/2 passengers.

Compared with the previous year the number of passengers carried increased nearly 9,500,000 and the number of miles run by over 1,000,000; the passengers carried per mile run increased from 3,500,000 to 4,500,000. The amount of paid up capital invested in electric railways is \$21,700,000.

The steam railways in 1899 carried 16,168,191 passengers, running a train mileage of 25,292,856, thus making an average of 1 1/2 passengers per mile.
