THE NEW SPURGEON TABER-NACLE.

Mention has been made of the opening of the new Tabernacle, replacing the burned one in which the great Spurgeon preached for so many years. This description of the new edifice from the interior will be interesting : Lighted by 427 electric globes, no theater or music hall in London is so beautiful in its appearance. The decorations are in pale green, gold and cream color. The portico is almost dazzling in its purity. Whereas it used to take forty-five minutes to light up the former building, the present

can be flooded with light in as many seconds. As some Americans remember with regret, there was no means of heating the former building, and the air was often heavy and unwholesome for lack of ventilation. The new build. ing can be warmed and is ventilated to perfection by ingenious contrivances specially designed for use here. Although the requirements of the building laws in London are strict, the archietects of the new Tabernacle have far. exceeded the requirements of the statute in providing fire-proof construction and abundant exits. All the aisles are unusually broad and the ascents are of an easy grade. The building practically covers the same ground as its predecessor, seating

2,705 persons. Twenty-eight seats for the twenty eight deacons are placed near the pulpit. The acoustics are remarkably good. The total cost of rebuilding has been \$270,000, about one-half of which came from insurance upon the old building. The great work of the Tabernacle is again under
