NOVA SCOTIA.

C. R. Casey has filled his resignation as Scott act inspector for Amherst.

The Kerr Evaporating Co., whose manufactory is in Canning, is working night and day on imperial government orders. They shipped some four tons in one lot one day last week, and there is more to go.

A fatal accident occurred a few days ago at Trarcon. A man named Pace fell from the roof of a house and was killed.

Mr. John F. Stairs, ex-M. P. of Halifax, and Graham Esser, of New Glasgow, are making arrangements for the flotation of a big steel and wire works of the same nature as the Dominion Steel Co., to be located at North Sydney, C. B. Upper Province capitalists are interested.

The duties collected at the Sydney, C. B. customs house during January amounted to \$23,146.54, as against \$20,006.90 in December, 1899, and against \$227.92 in January, 1899. The value of the coal exports for January, 1900, is \$92,834.

W. W. Back, a Springhill blacksmith, is under arrest charged with passing counterfeit money.

The schooner Annie Greenlaw, arrived at Gloucester, reported the loss of Arthur Crowell, one of the crew. The accident occurred about 75 miles east of Thatcher's Island. Crowell was engaged with his shipmates in furling the mainsail when a big wave knocked him off the boom into the sea. Crowell was 23 years old, single, and a native of Shelburne.

A case is now before the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, which was started in Sydney in 1885, and has been before the courts ever since. The original suit was for \$25, the amount of a note, and the cost now amount to \$1,700. The case is not finished.

A terrible shooting accident by which a young man lost his life, happened at Little River, Yarmouth county, Tuesday last week. Clayton Sullivan, son of Augustus Sullivan, of Yarmouth, was on a short visit to his uncle, George Beveridge, at Little River. There is a pond near the house and a flock of ducks was seen there. Early Tuesday morning before dawn young Sullivan and his uncle, each unknown to the other, started for the pond to get a shot at the ducks. They got on different sides of the pond. The uncle seeing a black mass among the rushes on the opposite side of the pond fired and young Sullivan received the entire charge through his head, killing him instantly.

Mr. E. L. Armstrong of Pictou has been appointed Inspector of Schools for Pictou County.

While John Millie was attempting to cross the main slope at Springhill mines on Thursday he was struck by a fullrake, which was being hauled up from the bottom of the pit, and killed.

A lumberman named Joseph Langille, belonging to Wallace Bridge, N. S., was struck and killed by the maritime express from Halifax Wednesday night, about two miles west of Springhill junction. He was walking on the track and as a high wind prevailed at the time it is supposed that he failed to hear the approaching train.

The Halifax Electric Tramway Company Limited, held their fourth annual meeting last week. Statements of the past year's business show a net profit of \$61,798.87 as compared with \$54,748.54 for the previous year. In all 2,616,231 passengers were carried, an increase of 106,963 over last year. The gross receipts for the year from lighting and tramway were \$203,935.86.

OTHER PROVINCES.

Four persons were killed by a collision of two teams with the Canadian Pacific's Quebec express at a crossing near Three Rivers, Que., Thursday afternoon.

The steamer Guernsey from Vancouver, with three million feet of lumber for Shanghai, China, and Vladivostok, Russia. This is the largest lumber cargo ever taken from British Columbia.

In the two cars destroyed by fire in recent railway accident at Newfound land there were baggage, express baggage and mail, the latter being a heavy one, including 44 registered letters, 17 for Boston, 13 Mon real, 7 Toronto, 6 North Sydney and Truro, and 1 Halifax. They were all burned.

Alexander Ramsay, of Seabright, Ont., was smothered to death Friday in a straw stack on which he was at work, when the heavy wind caused it to fall over him. The stack was heavy with ice.

A St. John's Nfld despatch says: The last American herring vessel left Placentia Bay, having abandoned the fishery in consequence of the mild weather. About forty vessels have failed to secure cargoes, thus involving a shortage of about 50,000 barrels of herring. This result, which is the worst in ten years, will cripple the American dealers concerned in the industry. The coast fishermen will lose nearly \$100,000.

At Vankleek Hill, Ont. an earthquake shock was felt Saturday morning. The shock lasted several seconds and was noticed in all parts of the town. Windows rattled and houses shook perceptibly.

UNITED STATES.

A violent rain storm prevailed along the lower Hudson last week doing considerable damage by washouts around Nyack, N. Y.

The subscription list of the Dawey Arch Fund, about to be published, will show that the sum raised so far is less than \$200,000. Some members of the fund committee declare that they have lost hope for the success of the perpetuation scheme.

There was a \$50,000 fire at Portland, Me., Wednesday at the three story building, number 514-516 Congress street.

Roland Burnham Molineux, New York, was sentenced Friday to die in the electric chair during the week of March 26.

President Schurman of Cornell, has been offered the governorship of the Philippines, and has declined the offer. Roosevelt has done likewise.

In the February number of the Review of Reviews appears an illustrated character sketch of the late Dwight L. Moody.

Two soldiers' careers, also, are sketched in the February number of the Review of Reviews; the long army service of the late General Lawton are reviewed by his old commander, Gen. O. O. Howard, and the life story of Field Marshal Lord Roberts, commander-in-chief of the British forces in South Africa, is told in an unsigned article.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The distress arising from famine in India is steadily increasing and those now in receipt of relief number 3,784,000.

British Commissioners Kiddle and Sutherland, who had been engaged in the demarcation of the Borno-Chinese boundary, have been murdered in the Mungben district. Consul Litton was wounded, but escaped.

Havana despatches say that the scarcity of labor in the farming sections of Cuba is threatening to prove a serious menace to the agricultural interests, especially to the sugar growing industry. Some large sugar plantations which were ready to ground have been obliged to shut down; while on the Narcisca plantation, which would produce 100,000 bags this year, the cane are still standing, and it is feared that the crop will be a total loss. It is said that an effort will be made to encourage the immigration of Spanish or Italian classes to work the plantations.

Argentine Republic and Portuguese ports have been declared free of the bubonic plague.

Rains and a rapid thaw last week caused many rivers to overflow and there were floods in various parts of the United Kingdom. Several towns were inundated, damage was done to farms, hundreds of sheep and other live stock were drowned.

A heavy storm prevailed throughout France Wednesday. Telegraph lines were broken everywhere and communication by wire with Great Britain, Italy, Spain, Switzerland and part of Germany was interrupted. Considerable damage was done and some fatalities by falling roofs and trees. The seaside towns have suffered badly.
