N. B. LEGISLATURE.

News of the Week.

**MONDAY.**—Answering an inquiry, Mr. Emmerson said an arrangement was made for the translation and publication of the debates in French with the *Courier of Bathurst* and the *Evangeline of Weymouth*. The former paper was to be paid \$200 and the other would be paid in proportion to the amount of work done.

Mr. Tweedie said compulsory vaccination was in force in Restigouche, Gloucester, Northumberland and Westmorland counties.

Answering Mr. Fleming's inquiry with respect to the rearranging of the piers of the Woodstock bridge, Mr. White said tenders were received. The men tendering and the amount of their tenders were: Jeremiah Bragdon, \$125; J. E. Simmons, \$160; Albert Brewer, \$350 per cubic yard. Mr. Bragdon declined to enter upon the contract and so did Mr. Simmon. The department did not make a contract with Mr. Brewer, owing to his high figures. Afterwards an offer of J. S. Leighton at \$2.50 per cubic yard was accepted.

Mr. Emmerson announced that the lieutenant governor is ill at his home at Riverside, Albert Co.

The speaker appointed Messrs. Carvell, Gibson, Shaw, Young, Hazen, Leeger and Fish the committee to investigate the bridge charges.

**TUESDAY.**—Mr. Tweedie committed a bill in addition to the act to provide for the erection of permanent bridges. He explained that the bill gave authority for the issue of short term 4 per cent bonds. They would be issued in preference to the 3 per cent bonds authorized by the permanent bridge act until the money market assumed a more healthy tone. Agreed to.

Mr. Tweedie committed a bill in addition to the public health act of 1898. The bill proposed to assist the counties to the extent of \$15,000. He regretted to say that there were still some new cases of small-pox reported. Agreed to.

Mr. Emmerson committed the bill to aid in the establishment of an agricultural and technical school for the maritime provinces. The bill was agreed to.

**NEW BRUNSWICK.**

All the young people from Carleton county who are attending the Normal School and the U. N. B. spent a delightful time on Friday evening as the guests of J. K. Fleming, M. P. P.

The house of N. Fraser, Bathurst, was burned Tuesday. Partially insured.

F. H. Hale has recommenced operations at his works at Plaster Rock. About 150 men and a large number of teams will be employed.

H. Beckwith was re-elected Mayor of the city last week, and the following were elected Aldermen: Messrs. Ryan, Merrithew, McKay, Vanwart, Maxwell, Farrell, Moore, Clark, Smith and McKendrick.

The Moncton civic elections last week resulted in the return of F. W. Sumner as Mayor, and for Aldermen Messrs. Reid, Bourgne, Smith, Winter Gross, Ryan, Givan and Martin.

In Woodstock, Wednesday, the case of Pryor, indicted for common assault, on Mrs. Dr. Brown of Centreville, was found guilty.

In New Brunswick there are 121 light houses, 2 light-ships and 12 steam fog alarms.

The westbound express on the I. C. R. ran into a plow special at Dalhousie Junction Thursday, doing considerable damage to two engines and a van. Conductor Dickson was cut about the head and badly shaken up. Brakeman E. Lutz had his ankle broken and leg bruised. Brakeman Jos. Horseman is cut about the head and his arm was injured. Corbett of Newcastle was badly scalded.

The Bank of New Brunswick directors have elected Mr. James Manchester president in place of the late Mr. Lewin.

On the Intercolonial Railway near Nauwigawack station Saturday afternoon Willie Saunders, the 11-year-old son of Mr. Anthony Saunders, farmer, was struck by a train and killed. He and some other boys were playing on the track.

Nason and Thornton, recently sentenced by Judge Stevens to seven years in Dorchester penitentiary for theft, escaped from Woodstock jail Saturday night by lifting up the register from one of the furnace pipes and getting down and out by the way of the cellar.

The house and barn owned by William Smith, a short distance above Sussex Corner, were totally destroyed by fire Saturday morning with most of their contents.

**NOVA SCOTIA.**

The Leinster regiment are under orders to sail from Halifax for England on March 25th.

Total apple shipments from Halifax this year reached 239,694 bbls.

The officials of the Nova Scotia government are sending to Lord Roberts and Captain H. B. Stairs, South Africa, each a barrel of non-pariel apples. They were sent on the Monterey.

A Kentville paper says the steamer *Beaver* will go on the Canning-Parrsboro-St. John route very soon, and earlier than last year.

Coal has been reached in the seven foot seam of Mann & McKenzie's areas at Broad Cove, C. B., and positions for slopes have been staked off.

The Atlas Tack Co., of Taunton, Mass., are considering the desirability of erecting a large factory in Sydney.

The Trappist monks now stationed at Tracadie, N. S., have under contemplation the removal of the order to Pawtucket, R. I.

It is stated that a movement is on foot, having for its object the tunnelling of the straits of Canso between Mulgrave and Point Tupper.

There is living at Horton Bluff, Kings, a colored veteran named William Hall, who enjoys the unique distinction of being a V. C. man, the only one probably in the whole Dominion. He obtained this coveted honor in India, 1857, during the mutiny, where as captain, he fought a naval gun in a most heroic manner under circumstances of extreme peril.

The Acadia sugar refinery company will erect a handsome new building for their offices at the corner of Duke and Hollis street, Halifax.

At Glace Bay, C. B., Friday a fatal accident occurred whereby a young man named Alexander McCulloch lost his life. He was breaking on a coal train and fell between the cars, which passed over his body. He was about twenty-four years of age.

In the Legislature the proposal to establish a technical college which will serve the purposes of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island is making headway.

R. C. Reid, Newfoundland, has purchased vast lumber areas in the ancient colony, in connection with which he intends to erect three lumber mills, one with a capacity of 40,000,000 feet and two others of 20,000,000 feet each. It is believed that the enterprise will give employment to 3,000 men, and that it will require 80 steamers of 2,500 tons each to convey the stock to market.

**UNITED STATES.**

At Detroit, Mr. Michael McDonald on Friday gave birth to two boys and two girls.

As the supposed result of despondency caused by ill-health, Edward N. Roche, 32 years old, of Gardner, Mass., committed suicide by shooting on Wednesday afternoon in the Boston public garden.

Incendiarism is rampant in Barbados. Within four weeks sixty sugar estates have been set on fire by negroes, and fears are entertained for the safety of the city of Bridgetown. The negroes are starving and lawless in the small island with its abundant population, and the situation is growing grave.

24 persons, mostly Italian children, were burned to death at Newark, New Jersey, last Sunday night.

Certain butchers in San Francisco have been detected in using horseflesh as a substitute for beef in sausages, etc., owing to the cheapness of the equine flesh. The local Board of Health has brought the offenders to justice. The flesh of horses selected with proper care and killed under proper conditions is not an unwholesome article of diet, says the *New York Medical Journal*, but there is no excuse for foisting it under false pretences upon customers in place of more expensive beef and other meats.

The dwelling house of William Gower in Calais was burned to the ground Saturday night.

At Columbus, Ohio, Saturday, five dead, two fatally and one seriously injured was the result of an attempt to start a fire with gasoline.

**AN IMPORTANT INDUSTRY.**

The G. & G. Flaxwell Company, of Hampton, which controls the mills at Hampton village, Perry's Point and Moss Glenn, has developed into a very important industry, especially so because they manufacture their lumber into a more finished article than the ordinary saw mills. The company expect to get out over 7,000,000 superficial feet of spruce and pine logs this winter, to be manufactured chiefly into box shooks, boxes, onion crates, matches, etc. In the summer when all the mills are running they employ between 200 and 300 men.

The box trade has greatly developed in recent years. They make boxes for the factories that turn out soap, confectionary, cured fish, biscuits, spices, and other goods, and they ship to Amherst, Petou, Truro, Yarmouth, Moncton, St. S'ephens, Fredericton and other factory towns through the provinces.

The St. John market for their boxes has been greatly enlarged since some of our local firms have gone more largely into the direct importation, bleaching and packing of teas. For example, the company last week received an order from T. H. Estabrooks, the North Wharf tea importer and blender, for 3,000 cases to hold 100 pound each, and 2,000 cases to hold 60 pounds each of his Red Rose tea. These 5,000 cases will thus hold 210 tons of tea.—*St. John Daily Telegraph.*

According to private letters received from Paris smallpox is epidemic in the French capital.

Flores, Aguinaldo's secretary of war, has surrendered to Gen. MacArthur. Aguinaldo's infant son, who was captured in November and who has been suffering from smallpox, is dead.

From June 4 to Dec. 4, 1899, 296 cases of the plague and 107 cases are reported to have occurred in Portugal and of these 293 cases and 106 deaths happened in Oporto district which includes the town and the adjoining country.

According to a despatch from Buenos Ayres, a revolution has broken out in Esteroles. The insurgents have occupied three of the principal towns of the province.

A Constantinople despatch says: there is great anxiety in official circles regarding the Russian government's refusal to modify its demands regarding railroad concessions in Asia Minor. The Turkish government advises against submission and the sultan is awaiting a military report on the strategic aspect of the question before giving a decision.

The government of Brazil has sent a circular letter to the governors of the different states announcing that a conspiracy to establish a monarchy has been discovered. Several officers are implicated.

An important public meeting called by the elected members to the legislature and council of Jamaica to protect against the action of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, in sending four additional government members to the council, was held Wednesday. Resolutions were adopted providing that two delegates proceed to London for the purpose of representing to Secretary Chamberlain and the British parliament the injustice done to Jamaica.

Gen. Sir Wm. Stephen Alexander Lockhart, commander-in-chief of the British forces in India, died at Calcutta, Sunday.
