Rev. D Patterson presented a draft of form for Sunday School reports. The consideration of it was deferred till the present stock of forms is used.

Rev. A. W. Currie having been granted dismissal from the N. S. Conference, was, by vote, received to membership in the N. B. Conference.

The Secretary of the Board of Managers, Dr. Hartley, presented a report as follows:

In submitting to this Conference another Annual Report, your Board of Managers is pleased to be able to say, that the business affairs of the Conference entrusted to the Board, have been attended to in the usual careful way. The investments and rate of interest remain about as last year. The Treasurer's account will give a detailed statement of the finances. There has been no need of calling the Board together during the year, and of course nothing more than the ordinary routine of business has been done. We think the general financial outlook of the denomination as represented by such property as church buildings and parsonages is healthful and encouraging. Old meeting houses that served well their generation, have been enlarged and rebuilt, and in some places, replaced by new, more comfortable and larger edifices. Communities that have found it difficult to secure a satisfactory pastor on account of having no house for the pastor's family to occupy, have built, and are building comfortable parsonages. A fact that must be gratifying to all who wish our Zion well, and especially helpful to the particular congregations. We hope this building spirit will spread until no pastor in the Conference will be deprived of a pastor on account of having no home for the minister and his family. Good comfortable houses for the people to worship in, and good comfortable homes for the pastor's family, are important factors in making churches more efficient.

Your Board has every reason to believe that all the local Boards of Trustees appointed by this Conference have been true to their trusts and have exercised careful oversight over their several church properties.

The Treasurer of the Board of Managers, B. S. Palmer, presented his report. It will appear with the Auditor's report.

DECEASED BRETHREN. The report on Deceased Brethren was presented by Rev. C. T. Phillips, as follows:

We have to report the death, during the year, of Rev. Thomas Connor and Rev. Elijah B. Gray. The illness of bro Connor was long and severe. For five years he had not been in General Conference, much to his regret, for his love for his brethren was tender and strong. The early years of his ministry were very fruitful, for there were extensive revivals under his preaching. How many he led to the Saviour is known only where perfect records are kept. Bro Connor had strong faith in the promises of God. He often said that he "knew the advantages of this life," and he longed, like a home-sick child, to enter "the land of the living." To his widow and children we extend our sympathy.

Bro Gray was with us at Conference last year. He seemed to be in his usual health, and the news of his death came as a shock to his brethren. Bro Gray had the esteem and confidence of his brother ministers, and of the churches wherever he was known. That he was best loved where he was best known is a testimony to his worth that may well be coveted. He died, as he lived, strong in the faith of the Lord Jesus Christ. To his widow the Conference expresses sympathy in her loneliness.

Following the adoption of this report, the Conference, led by Rev. B. H. Nobles, knelt in prayer for the bereaved widows and families.

Rev. F. S. Hartley was, on motion, appointed to collect data concerning deceased ministers, for publication in the Year Book. It was voted that the next Annual session of Conference be held on the first Saturday in October 1901. The Conference voted approval of the action of the Foreign Mission Executive in sending Rev. C. T. Phillips as delegate to the Ecumenical Missionary Conference, and authorized the payment of the expenses. The following resolution was adopted: WHEREAS it has become known that the Department of Railways of Canada issues free passes over the Intercolonial Railway to eight Roman Catholic bishops, to seven bishops of the Church of England, to the moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian church, to the General Superintendent of the Methodist church, and to the President of the Methodist Conference of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island; AND WHEREAS, no such favours are given to the official heads of other denominations; THEREFORE RESOLVED (1) That this Conference hereby records its protest

against discrimination in favour of any ecclesiastical officers; (2) its belief that such passes should be given to the presiding officers of all religious denominations in the Dominion, or to none.

Rev. J. W. Clarke, Treasurer, reported that he had received for the General Secretary Fund \$100.00, and had paid the same amount.

The General Secretary made a statement about work during the year; that other duties had made it impossible for him to give but little time to the work.

The Conference voted hearty thanks to the pastor, church and people of Hampstead for their great hospitality. On motion of Rev. B. H. Nobles, the Conference re-affirmed its confidence in the RELIGIOUS INTELLIGENCER as the able exponent and representative of our principles, and urging all Free Baptist people to become subscribers.

FROM THE BAPTIST CONVENTION. The Secretary read the following letter from Rev. Dr. Gates, Chairman of the delegation appointed by the Baptist Convention to attend the Conference:

To the Free Baptist Conference assembled at Hampstead— Greeting— Dear Brethren— At the meeting of the Maritime Baptist Convention held in Halifax, Aug. last, Hon. B. R. Emmerson, Rev. J. D. Freeman and the undersigned were appointed a committee to bear to you the fraternal greetings of our body.

In communication with my brethren at the committee—neither of whom I could arrange to be present at your present sessions I was requested by them to present our greetings, it being expected that I could enjoy the privilege of meeting with you. I am sorry that I can not, owing to circumstances beyond my control and so will seek to discharge what is more a privilege than duty, in a few broken lines; though I would much prefer being present and speaking what is in my heart to say to you.

Permit me first to say the communication sent us through our dear brother Dr. McLeod was most heartily appreciated and the kind things said in his letter are cordially reciprocated by us. We rejoice with you in the prosperity which is yours. And we pray that in days to come yet greater things may be accomplished through you. We thank God for the spirit of brotherliness now existing between our two denominations and we would be glad to be in the Providence of God such could be, that the Baptist bodies of the Maritime Provinces might be yet more closely united engaging as one in advancing the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ. While in the past under somewhat different names but yet substantially one in principles we have thanks to our God accomplished much; the age in which we live is of such a trend in its religious requirements, that with one name—one strong denomination, we could accomplish more.

This subject of closer union which has engaged our thought—now for years, ought still to be carefully and prayerfully considered, and if the "Captain of the Lord's Host," would lead us in closer relationships we ought to gladly follow.

I hope the presence of the Master will be signally felt by you in all your present sessions; that in your praises and prayers; He may through the Holy Spirit, give you great spiritual uplifts; that in your deliberations, in planning and executing, in seeking to enlarge your work, that wisdom from above may be graciously given you.

For you and for our own body we pray that the 20th Century may witness triumphs won by us—under Jesus leadership—grander than any in the past.

Our history in the 19th Century should intensify our faith in God and fire our souls with zeal for Him and His cause. We are still convinced that the old Gospel is God's power unto salvation to every one that believes and our duty is as binding as ever to preach it—to preach it in faith-telling its blessed truths with joy, presenting its offers of grace, not shunning to speak of the ruin following its rejection. May your ministers be clothed with power—may your churches be beacon lights, and in heaven may we find that God has crowned what here in grace He has begun.

Again expressing the hope that your present Conference may be blessed to you and through you a blessing to others. I am dear brethren yours in behalf of our Com., in Christian love. G. O. GATES. The Corresponding Secretary was instructed to make a suitable reply. The Conference again went into committee on licentiate. Dr. McLeod chairman. The Committee rose and reported as follows: Four committee on Licentiate recommendations— 1. That F. H. Knollie, Allen A. Rideout, J. H. Puddington, Weyman E. Kirkpatrick and H. H. Ferguson be granted General Conference License. 2. That M. L. Gregg be ordained this evening, in this church. 3. That J. C. Wilson and E. H. Cochrane be continued on the District Meeting license. 4. That we regret that H. M. Manner, a church licentiate, failed through inadvertence, to attend the last session of the Third District Meeting; and that we commend him to the sympathy and confidence of our people. The report was considered section by section, and adopted. Adjourned.
