News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

In the case of the Runciman estate against the Star Line Steamship Co., the jury gave a verdict of \$3,500 for plaintiff.

A. H. Vanwart of Fredericton shipped a carload of hay on Monday for Boston market, the first that has gone there from Fredericton for many years.

At Victoria Mills, Fredericton on Tuesday the twelve year old daughter of William Campbell was frightfully burned by the explosion of a stove, near which she was standing.

Two sons of David Peacock, of Stanley, were playing Sunday afternoon with a gun that they "didn't know was loaded," when one pointing at the other pulled the trigger. A load of buckshot was discharged and shattered one of the young lad's hands in such a way as to necessitate amputation of the member. The boys are aged respectively fourteen and sixteen years.

A storehouse owned by James A. Calder at Campbell, was burned Tuesday night, the loss to the building and contents being \$1,500, with no insurance. In attempting to save the contents of the building Mr. Calder was overcome by smoke and his face and hands were badly burned.

Word was received on Wednesday of the death at Crawford's Camp of Walter McFarlane, son of Alexander McFarlane, of Kingsley, York county.

Scott Act Inspector Colpitta of Carleton Co., reported to the County Council last week that during the year he had paid to the secretary-treasurer \$400 over and above what he received from him, and had now in his hands \$83.50.

John and Stephen Tobin, who hail from Halifax, but have been living in Moncton for some time, were before Judge Wedderburn at Hopewell Wednesday, charged with swindling people. Stephen, who represented himself as a blind man, was given three years in Dorchester penitentiary, and John, who travelled along with him, two years.

Mr. S. Merritt Welton, agent at St. John of the S. P. C. A., has received from the Royal Humane Society the prominent certificate awarded to Mr. Oliver P. Simpson, of Boston, for his gallant attempt to rescue Mr. John Ruciman. The certificate will probably be sent to Boston to be formally presented to Mr. Simpson.

Nova Scotia.

Louis Pommert, Augustus White, Geo. Llewellyn and Burns Moody, four of the crew of the fishing schooner Edith S. Walen, of Gloucester, Mass., found watery graves off the N. B. Scotia coast on New Year's day.

The streets of Liverpool were lighted by electricity for the first time last week.

The London apple market continues to send good returns for Nova Scotia fruit.

A Truro-Bule railway line is now being discussed. Such a railway would greatly shorten the journey between Halifax and Charlotte town.

The Halifax S. P. C. has dealt with 86 cases within the past three months. Women and children, as well as lower animals have been protected.

John Redman of Higgins settlement Halifax Co., while chopping in the woods was fatally injured by a lodged tree falling upon him. He survived 24 hours.

The Bank of Nova Scotia makes an exceedingly good showing for the past year. Its paid up capital is \$1,760,000.

The Burrill-Johnston works were sold at auction at Yarmouth, Jan. 11th, for \$35,000 to H. Bradford Cann.

Lord's foundry and machine shop at Kentville was destroyed by fire Jan. 11th. The loss is about \$15,000.

Neil McDonald, while on his way Thursday from Port Morien, C. B. to Glace Bay, was overtaken by some unknown person and beaten so that he died a few minutes after he was taken to Glace Bay.

The closing scene of the famous Whitehead Guysboro scuttling case took place Thursday, when Judge Magher sentenced William D. Deeks to six years in Dorchester.

Cowan & Cassaboom's lobster factory, recently erected at Gulliver's Cove, Digby, was destroyed by fire Friday night. It is said to be insured.

Messrs. Simmons and Burpee have been awarded the contract for building a wharf at Mulgrave, N. S., the work is to be completed in June next. The contract price is \$25,000.

Other Provinces.

Two freight trains on the Grand Trunk collided near St. Henri station, Que., Wednesday. The engine of one train ploughed through the van of the second, instantly killing Conductor Ramsden.

A dyke protecting the farm lands of the valley of the Fraser river, twenty miles from the Gulf of Georgia, broke one day last week, inundating a district over one hundred miles. Seven-ton, a town of 4,000 inhabitants, was flooded, over three feet of water covering the streets.

Just when the health authorities had the smallpox epidemic stamped out in Kamouraska, P. Q. it has made its appearance in the parish of St. Germain. There are seven new cases in a previously uninfected parish.

William Campbell was killed by falling off the C. P. R. train at Milton, Ont., Monday night. He was sixty-five years old, and was on the way to Toronto to say farewell to his son, Sergt. W. A. Campbell, jr., of the Toronto section of the Canadian Mounted Rifles, when he met death.

Sydney C. B. has now sixteen lawyers, thirteen doctors and five bank institutions.

The Newfoundland revenue for the six months ended Dec. 31 shows an increase of \$230,000 over the receipts of the corresponding half-year in 1898.

The Toronto Mail's Winnipeg despatch says the Macdonald administration finds \$200,000 deficit in the treasury. The province is alleged to be committed to big railway contracts.

Winnipeg was visited by a serious fire Thursday. The Manitoba produce building and stock were destroyed, involving a loss of \$76,000; insurance, \$40,000.

The jury at Toronto in the case of Henry Williams, charged with the murder of J. E. Varcoe, on Thursday returned a verdict of guilty, with a unanimous recommendation to mercy. The prisoner was sentenced to be hanged on April 13.

In Montreal Ferdinand Lemieux, J. J. Herbert, W. L. Fellowes, Ernest Fellowes and James Baxter have been committed to stand their trial at the next term of the Court of Queen's Bench. Herbert is charged with theft and conspiracy, while Baxter and the two Fellowes are accused of receiving stolen money and conspiracy to rob the Ville Marie Bank.

United States.

In Honolulu, seven additional cases of plague have developed since last advice, making 13 cases to date. A portion of the infected district has been condemned and burned to the ground.

Mrs. Joseph Christie, of McPherson, Kansas, on Wednesday cut the throats of her two children, both under six years old, then cut her own throat and set fire to the house. The children died at once and Mrs. Christie's soon afterwards.

Advices from White Oaks, N. M., in the Sacramento mountains, 150 miles northeast of El Paso, say that section was swept by a blizzard, Wednesday, the effects of which were disastrous. Many thousand head of stock, were frozen.

Lewis E. Gildsmith, the cashier who stole \$91,000 from the Port Jarvis N. Y., National Bank, was, on Thursday, sentenced to eight years' imprisonment.

A company has been formed and is now powerful whose plan is to buy from the French the Panama canal and to construct it with United States money.

At Knoxville, Tenn., Jacob Shudin murdered his wife and then killed his father, Saturday. The tragedy is said to be the culmination of troubles in family. Joseph Saudin, a son, has been arrested charged with being a party to the murder of his mother.

British and Foreign.

Heavy gales are blowing along the entire French coast and a number of small vessels have been lost. Heavy weather is reported from all Mediterranean ports.

Louise Masse, a French governess, who was convicted of the murder of her illegitimate three year old son, was hanged at Newgate Tuesday.

Advices from India report that the famine there grows darker every week. Three million men are work-

ing on government relief works. Families are breaking up, each member acting for himself in search of food. Abandoned children are found with frequency. It is a famine of water as well as food. Cattle are dying by thousands, and no rain is now expected until June.

The bubonic plague has made its appearance at Rio Janeiro, Brazil. There has been one death.

A widespread scandal has resulted in Berlin from the discovery that, owing to the omnivorous of officials in the Berlin stockyards large quantities of condemned tubercular beef has been smuggled through and sold to a large restaurant and to several big sausage makers. An official investigation has been organized.

Wapons of War.

In these days we have from day to day to read war news, and it is well to know the meaning of terms used. A "Crenset" is a gun manufactured by famous French firm, Schneiders, who have great works at Crenset, France.

A "Krupp" is manufactured by the Prussian firm of Krupp. A "Maxim" gun is the invention of an American of that name. A Howitzer is a cannon cut very short in order to reduce its weight so that it may be portable. It is dragged by horses, on the trot if the roads are tolerable. Cannon is rifled so that the ball or shell fired shall leave it with a spinning or revolving motion the effects of which can be accurately calculated.

We have read a good deal lately of Lyddite shells. The shells bear this name from Lydd, the place in England where practice in firing is carried on. Germany and France have been trying to invent a stronger explosive for shells than gun-powder. Picric acid meets the case, only that picric acid soon loses its strength. But a preparation of which picric acid is the base now serves the purpose. France uses Melenite. Germany uses an equivalent. An Englishman has invented "Lyddite." Howitzers were fitted to fire Lyddite shells. The shells are about 4 7/8 inches in diameter and weigh about 50 lbs. 6
