News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

The barristers of New Brunswick are having a portrait of Chief Justice Tuck painted, to be placed in the Supreme Court, room Fredericton.

A horrible accident occurred at Gondola Point, Kings county on Sunday afternoon, 21st inst., by which Mrs. Pitt lost her life. Mrs. Pitt was alone in a room before the fire, when her clothing caught. Her cries attracted the attention of other members of the household, who ran to her assistance and put out the flames—not, however, before she had sustained terrible burns. She died in the evening.

E. Gibson, a C. P. R. brakeman, was killed Tuesday at Magaguadavic. A C. P. R. special on which Gibson was employed, was being backed up to the switch, when Gibson, apparently in his hurry to get off slipped, falling under the wheels of the tender. The wheels passed over his stomach, completely disembowelling him and mangle the body frightfully. He was a native of Andover, and unmarried.

Isaac Porter of Brookville, Albert Co., 75 years of age, was found dead in the woods on Sunday 21st. The deceased, a lumber operator, left his home on Saturday to cut a piece of timber land nearby. Not returning a search was instituted, and his body was found.

William McLellan, of Middle Coverdale, A. C., had a narrow escape from instant death while chopping in the woods Tuesday. A tree hit him on the head and shoulders, crushing him to the ground, breaking his breast bone and otherwise injuring him. He is about sixty years of age, but will probably recover.

At Dorchester, Wednesday, the case of the Queen vs. Stevenson and Bray on charge of conspiracy and obtaining money under false pretences, was brought to a close. The jury, after an absence of over three hours, were unable to agree and were discharged and the accused let out on bail, \$500 each.

Gloucester Co. is to erect a new Court House, at a cost of \$20,000.

A provincial government proclamation—after detailing the danger from the spread of small-pox—says: His Honor would therefore impress upon the Provincial Board of Health, the local boards and all citizens the urgent necessity of taking immediate and precautionary measures to prevent the spreading of the contagion, and would call upon all good citizens throughout the province to aid in every way the efforts of the authorities in stamping out the disease.

The following appointments have been made: Carleton County—Charles H. L. Perkins to be Justice of the Peace, and Commissioner of Parish of Woodstock Civil Court.

York—Wm. S. Tompkins to be Justice of the Peace.

Kings—Alfred L. Peatman to be a Justice of the Peace.

Queens—Alfred M. Day and Milford Robertson to be Justices of the Peace. J. Alonzo Bowes, Deputy Sheriff for Westmoreland County.

At Fredericton Friday two young sons of Daniel Ryan and a man named Wilson, from Nova Scotia, were blasting rock when the powder exploded. Wilson had his arm and hand badly mangled. A piece of rock struck one of the Ryans on the head and inflicted a severe cut. The other boy was knocked off his feet.

An evidence of the magnitude of the work yet to be done by the Dominion Iron & Steel Co., is the fact that not less than one thousand cubic yards of concrete will be used daily between now and the first day of July next. A large portion of the sand and gravel for this work is being brought from Grand Narrows, 45 miles from the site of the works.

Annapolis county last year paid bounty on fifty-five bears and 204 wild cats.

At Truro, Tuesday, James Spears, an I. C. R. employee, while crossing the tracks, was killed by a shunting engine. His legs and arms were severed and he was otherwise terribly mangled. He leaves a wife and two children.

E. P. Flynn, collector of customs at Arichat died Friday, after a short illness.

It is stated that on Wednesday last farmers were plowing at Westport.

Friday night a barge with 500 tons of coal was run down by the Str. Lake Ontario and sunk while at anchor in Halifax Harbour. The Captain, the only man on board, jumped into a small boat and was saved.

Mr. H. E. Hill, Musquodobi Harbor, is turning a lot of his marsh connected with his farm on the Grant Road into a cranberry bog.

Mrs. McCallum Nickerson, Clark's Harbour, met with a painful accident a few days ago, as she was leaving her father's home she slipped at the door and broke her ankle.

Other Provinces.

Some \$11,000 of the money stolen from the defunct Banque Ville Marie, Montreal, has been recovered.

Orders have been given that all passengers landing at Gortown or Cape Traverse, P. E. I., from the mainland will be vaccinated on arrival.

A fatal smash-up occurred on the Grand Trunk Railway at Port Union, sixteen miles east of Toronto, Wednesday night. W. Hutton, engineer, and fireman Loek, were killed.

Big copper reefs in British Columbia have been bought by the Rothschild family for two million dollars.

A wrecked vessel on Fox Tail Point By St. George, Nfld. is believed to be a large American sailing ship, probably lumber laden from the Gaspe coast. There is no sign of the crew and it is feared they have perished amid the ice laden waters adjacent.

After maintaining for over six weeks that he was suffering for a crime of others, Levi Stewart, a colored man lying in Sandwich, Ont., jail, under sentence of death, confessed on Wednesday that he was the murderer of old James Ross.

A deputation of the depositors of the Ville Marie Bank, numbering about seventy, waited upon the Premier, Messrs. Fielding and Tarte at Ottawa on Friday. They asked that the government should introduce into the estimates the sum of \$650,000, being fifty per cent. of the \$1,300,000 lost by the depositors consequent upon the bank's failure. They based their claim upon the part of the government.

United States.

James Pyle, a famous soap-maker of New York, died last Saturday, leaving a large fortune. Mr. Pyle was born Guysboro county, Nova Scotia, in 1823.

Henry A. Hazen, one of the chief forecasters of the weather bureau, Washington, died on Tuesday night as the result of injuries received by a bicycle collision with a negro pedestrian. Prof. Hazen was born in India fifty years ago, his father being a missionary.

British and Foreign.

The Australian colonies have declared Adelaide a plague-infected port.

Thirty thousand more Austrian miners have gone on strike. The total number now out is 70,000.

Jamaica has declined Mr. Chamberlain's English direct fruit trade scheme to divert the bulk of the colony's trade from America to England, which calls for a subsidy of £40,000 annually, Jamaica paying one-half.

Official reports give details of a terrible inundation which destroyed property valued at over 6,000,000 yen, in northern Japan, in December. Thirty-five towns in the district of Ishikari were devastated. Since September no less than 17,288 houses have been submerged or washed away in Hokkaido alone, while the total damage is placed at 13,000,000 yen. Complete returns show that about a hundred fishing schooners and other craft were destroyed or sunk during the severe storm which swept over the Japanese coast on Dec. 23 to 25. The total number of lives lost is placed at 189.

Winnipeggers think this a strange winter. They have not had a week of cold weather in all yet, and since Christmas it has been like May. There has been practically no sleighing.

There are several thousand cases of influenza in Rome. There are 10,000 influenza cases in Berlin and many thousands are reported all over Italy.

The released Spanish prisoners, 74 officers, 1,000 enlisted men, 22 civilian officials, 21 wives and 35 children, were furnished transportation to Spain from Manila on Thursday by General O'Lea.

The price of coal in Great Britain has advanced to an almost unprecedented figure.

The Emperor of China has abdicated in favor of a boy, nine years old, son of Prince Tuan. The Emperor is reported to have committed suicide. The whole thing is the doing of the Empress Dowager who wishes to rule for years to come.

Hungary leads the world in its wise treatment of bigamists. The man who has been foolish enough to marry two wives is obliged by law to live with both of them in the same house. No better deterrent could be imagined.

During December at Paris 708 accidents were caused by horses, resulting in 52 deaths and 656 injuries. In the same period there were only 21 automobile accidents and only one death.

A great strike of carpenters employed on the exposition buildings, Paris, involving 5,000 men, has been inaugurated. The strikers demanded an increase of wages to one franc per hour.

Following the example of Belgium and Italy, the Spanish Government has decreed that in all the public offices, and on all the public clocks the Spanish

day is henceforward to be observed as "one complete day of twenty-four hours," instead of "two half-days of twelve hours each." Midnight will therefore be known as "twenty-four o'clock."

MINISTERS' NAMES—Says the United Presbyterian: Ministers' names are much sought after for advertising purposes. "A retired clergyman," "A well-known minister," "Rev. Julius Blank," and many other appear as strong endorsers of almost everything from a hair restorer to a land company. Sometimes the names are fictitious, but very many are genuine, and the value of their names is in their being known to the readers of the circulars. Sometimes these names are given in good faith after a careful examination of the object advertised, sometimes they are given after a very superficial examination, or without examination, on the faith they have in the persons asking their names. The general effect is unhappy. Faith in the ministry is weakened. One led into a purchase or investment by some known name easily thinks less of the person after the loss and disappointment come. It is not unknown thing for the persons who give their names to suffer much mortification. We have known instances in which they prohibited the continued use of their names, but all the same, their names were paraded. The safe rule is never to give one's name for advertising purposes.

STRANGE FUNERAL MELODY—The Calais Advertiser passes along this story, told by an undertaker: "I had a funeral up river the other day, which was nearly spoiled by a music box. It was no fault of mine either, for the coffin was real rosewood and the appointments were perfect. "In the midst of the services, however, when the solemn hush was only broken by the voice of the clergyman, one of the mourners accidentally turned the crank of a music box, that was standing in the room. As luck would have it the old thing began to grind out 'There'll be a Hot Time the O' Lord To-night."
