

"While in St. Petersburg," said Dr. Baedeker, speaking in London recently, "I went one Sunday morning to a meeting of believers for the breaking of bread, and there I met three men who had a very neglected appearance, but they had come, I found, from the high north'-from the neighborhood, a most remarkable one. 
