An Important Aspect of Consecration.

Much attention is being given to-day to consecration in the life of Christian people. From many different quarters, and from many schools of religions thought, come words that eagerly press this necessity. The language used may sound very differently, but the underlying thought of all is, that in the life of Christian people there should be realized in daily experience what was in principle given when God in His infinite grace made them His children by the new birth.

To be sure, the word "consecration" is not found in Scripture as often as the average Christian imagines, but the thing itself is here from beginning to end. The principle of consecration, so far as the will has to do with it, is here made very clear. Christians are exhorted to yield themselves unto God. The supreme object of Christian devotion often falls short of God. It is easy to think that the supreme object is to serve our church, or our theologi. cal views, or our own personal growth in grace. All these things are good in themselves, but they are not good enough. For the Christian there must be one great centre for his life, one burning passion in his service, and this must be nothing less than God. Toward God the proper attitude is submission. Man was made to be a master over the lower orders of creation in this world, but he was just as clearly made to have a master over him. In the properly ordered life this master is God. And toward God the proper attitude is submission, the submission of a yielded life. In many cases Christian people are just within reach of great usefulness and great spiritual development, but they miss these blessings because something is held back, and God is treated with reserve, For this there is only one cure, and that is to yield. In the principle of consecration there is a third important element. The thing that is to be yielded is ourselves. This is vastly more than what we produce in any way. This covers the source and centre of all. It is ourselves that God asks for and must have. Probably this is where most of the weakness in consecration lies, and a serious weakness it must ever be. We may give large sums of money, we may give oceans of activity, we may give wide areas of time, without giving ourselves, and yet it is ourselves that God wants,

In the words of Paul, we have also the spirit of the consecrated life, "as those that are alive from the dead." The consecrated Christian, then, is a

There are three things held sacred by Christianity, the Lord's Book, the Lord's House, and the Lord's Day. The Lord's Book, God's revealed truth, might have been transmitted by oral tradition, but this could easily fade out, and would, in the course of time, most likely have been corrupted. A revelation made afresh to each successive generation would involve the peril of counterfeit revelations and open the door to imposture and fraud. Revelation in the form of a book is fixed and certain; cannot le corrupted, is easily transmitted, and constitutes an abiding court of appeal.
