News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

A lot of lime is being shipped from St. John to Sydney.

The Albert mines, owned by Capt. H. A. Cunniff, have been sold to the American capitalist who recently purchased the Salisbury and Harvey Railway. The price paid is said to be \$20,000.

A passenger train on the St. Martins and Upham Railway was derailed Tuesday and considerable damage done. One or two passengers were more or less injured, but fortunately not seriously.

James A. Calder, of Campbellton, says the Eastport Sentinel has a contract with a New York house to furnish 150,000 pounds of smoked herring, ready for packing in fancy packages to supply a select trade; the head and tail of the herring are cut off and the fish otherwise cleaned, after which they are packed in sugar barrels containing 300 pounds each and twenty-five shipped every Monday. To fill the contract will require 200,000 pounds of herring, equal to 50,000 boxes, or about eight car loads.

Arsene P. Létour was killed at Edmundston a few days ago by the falling of the cellar wall, of a recently burned building, about which he was working.

On Tuesday a man named Jacob Mills was found drowned in North Rodney Slip St. John. The inquest developed nothing to show how he came to be drowned.

At Florenceville, C. Co., James Cox, at work on a hay press, got one of his legs caught in the straps of the machine and was badly injured.

The residence of Mr. Frederic Comeau, at Nigadoo, nine miles from Bathurst, was destroyed by fire Monday. Loss between two and three thousand dollars; partial insurance.

Mr. Wm. Douglas who for two terms represented Charlotte Co., in the Legislature, died at his home Moore's Mills, Friday.

William Crawford, aged 13, son of Frank Crawford, an employe in the C. P. R. sheds at Sand Point, St. John, was drowned in South Rodney slip, Friday afternoon.

Thursday night a barn of S. Gogan, Cocagne, Kent Co., was struck by lightning and burned. The cattle, horses, sheep and farming utensils were all destroyed.

Business at Campbellton has resumed its normal condition. The fumigation of mails and other precautions against smallpox have been discontinued.

The St. John mayoralty contest resulted in the election of J. W. Daniel with a majority of 602 over Mayor Sears, 964 over James Moulson, and 1,174 over Count DeBury.

In Chatham Mr. W. S. Loggie was elected mayor, defeating Prov. Sec'y Tweedie.

At Newcastle Donald Morrison was elected mayor, and Allen Ritchie, William Hickson, Phinney, S. Lounsbury, Major Maltby and H. Williston, aldermen. All the old tickets were defeated.

The tragedy at Lakeville, S. Co., in February, when Edward Lawrence, his wife and three children were burned to death has been revived, the man, Oscar Little, who was in the house the night of the fire, having been accused of the murder of Lawrence. Little is now under arrest. His examination begins Wednesday of this week.

Two St. John (West) fishermen—Peter Mangan and Ohas. Moore—were found dead in their boat Sunday morning, near Shag rocks at the Bay Shore. They went out Saturday afternoon, and nothing more was known of them till they were found dead. A rumor of foul play was in circulation but there was no evidence of any violence either on the men or on the boat, with the exception of a slight bruise on Moore's face. This is attributed to pressure against the boat's gunwale. The prevailing theory is that when the men pulled in their nets they were so heavy that the craft filled and sank, putting the two men into the water, that at the same time nets, oars and sail with the other apparatus of the boat were lost. After righting the boat and getting into her they died from exhaustion having had a very hard struggle in the water.

UNITED STATES.

Rev. C. B. Wilson, superintendent of the Stilian Institute, was killed by lightning on Monday at Tuscaloosa, Ala., while using the telephone.

Reports from Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama tell of heavy loss from floods, caused by the heavy rains of the past few days. Crops have suffered seriously and nearly every railroad in that section is badly handicapped by washouts and flooded tracks.

There is hardly a ranch in the western part of Texas that does not have its own private telephone system, and the barbed wires of the pasture fences are used exclusively for the purpose. A number of these private lines are fifty miles long, and messages are sent and received daily that distance without a break.

When Julius Koster, a New York bricklayer, recently inherited \$300,000 from Germany, his good fortune completed the breaking down of his mind, already weakened by illness, and he committed suicide.

Lewiston, Me., had a serious fire early Friday morning, the loss being about \$50,000. The carriage factory of Wade & Danton, on Park street, and Hallan's store, on Lisbon street, were gutted. Four tenement brick buildings on Park street, were also cleaned out, as well as two dwelling houses owned by the Lewiston Journal Company.

At Calais, Me., the Str. Rose Standish was burned, Friday, evening at the lower steamboat wharf. The freight shed was also badly damaged. The loss on the steamer is \$25,000; insurance, \$14,000; on the shed and pier, \$1,500, partially insured.

Einburg, Walsh county, N. D., was almost wiped out by fire Friday. Mrs. Lindahl and Mrs. B. J. Orson perished in the flames and one child barely escaped.

The packing house of the Ajax Dynamite Mills, at Kawawlin, Mich., blew up Friday, killing three men—William Weaver, Ed. Halligan and William VanVesseler.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

King Oscar and the Queen of Sweden and Norway are in London.

A French fishing boat Wednesday, foundered off Crookhaven in a storm, twenty-four persons being drowned.

Two Russian admirals and 42 other Russian naval officers of high rank, are reported to have been arrested at Sebastopol, owing to irregularities in the construction department and to the embezzlement of mill ions.

It is announced in the local press of Kingston, Ja., that in consequence of the failure of the banana crop in the parish of St. Thomas, widens, great acute suffering exists in that place and a number of deaths from starvation have occurred among the people there.

In May elections will be held in the one hundred and thirty-seven municipalities of Cuba. The suffrage will be restricted to those who can read and write and who have \$250.00 worth of property, or who fought in the Cuban Army. After the municipal elections a general convention will be held, and it will submit a scheme of government for the consideration of the United States.

The floods, last week have caused, at a conservative estimate, fully \$3,000,000 loss in Central and Southern Mississippi, to say nothing of the damage sustained by the railroads. In Louisiana, too, the damage done by the unprecedented rains was great. Half a score of towns are completely cut off from the outside world. From the Chunky river swamps, near Enterprise, comes the news of a heavy loss of life.

The Japan missions are to have a mission conference in 1900. There are about 600 Protestant missionaries in the empire, and it is hoped that 400 at least may gather in this conference, which may probably mark a new epoch in the history of Christian missions in the empire.
