News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Last week Premier Tweedie was presented with a team of driving horses by members of the House.

The St. John Globe says a prominent lawyer asserted quite lately that within the past three years fully a quarter of a million of dollars have disappeared in Fredericton after it was entrusted to the care and management of members of the legal profession; and another hundred thousand dollars have gone in the same way through the management, or whatever it is, of St. John lawyers.

The wheat yield of New Brunswick last year averaged 18.7 bushels per acre. The total crop was 504,000 bushels. Oats were five and a quarter bushels.

Fifty-four New Brunswick cheese factories produced three million pounds of cheese last year, an increase of a quarter of a million. Thirty-three butter factories made 564,600 pounds a gain of one third over last year, when there were twenty-five factories.

Mr. E. G. Russell, manager of the I. C. R., has been granted three months' leave of absence and will go south for the benefit of his health. Mr. Russell is understood to be suffering a severe attack of nervous depression.

Hay in Sackville is selling readily at \$12.00 a ton, and some men are asking \$12.00.

The house of Dawson P. Sceves at Lower Hillsboro, A. Co., with all his furniture and clothing, was destroyed by fire a few days ago. No insurance.

On Wednesday the body of a man named Harry Weatherbee was found lying across the track at Moncton, under a recently arrived train. The jury returned a verdict that deceased met his death by jumping off or on a car which was being shunted.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Thirty-one years ago gold was discovered in Nova Scotia. Last year's yield was 30,000 ounces, the banner output.

One of the most important discoveries of coal made recently is that at Black Rock, Mira, twelve miles from Sydney, C. B. A seam has been reached five feet thick and the coal is of excellent quality.

Newfoundlanders are coming in considerable numbers to Sydney.—The railway to Louisburg will be double-tracked.—The Dominion Coal Co. will soon construct their own cars.

There are in the field two candidates for the Mayoralty of Halifax for the ensuing year,—the present Mayor and Alderman Faulkner.

At Elderkin's shipyard, Port Greville, Tuesday, Joseph Wood, a ship carpenter fell into the hold of the vessel on which he was working striking on his head with fearful force. He died in an hour.

The legislature of Nova Scotia was prorogued Tuesday. Of 270 bills introduced, 198 were passed. One of the acts is a general subsidy bill, under which any town in the province may give to a steel shipbuilding company a flat subsidy of \$100,000 if the ratepayers approve.

A young son of Abner Neily, of Belle Isle, was instantly killed Wednesday by being kicked by a horse he was leading to water. The boy was about twelve years old.

The Halifax board of health has asked the city council to order a general vaccination.

Halibut are reported plentiful on the Nova Scotia coast, but lobsters are hard to get.

Eighteen doctors have been appointed to carry on the compulsory vaccination in Halifax.

Kentville's smallpox case ended fatally. A. C. Moore died Saturday.

Digby seems determined to be an up-to-date summer watering resort. Twenty-five acres of ground are being devoted to golf links, and an artificial bathing pond is being constructed, affording about 30,000 square feet of swimming surface, and capable of being refilled daily.

OTHER PROVINCES.

At Chatham, Ont., Tuesday, a horse driven by Mrs. Arnold ran away and jumped over a bridge forty feet high to the ground below, carrying Mrs. Arnold and two children with it. The mother was killed; the children, aged two and ten years respectively, escaped.

New cases of small-pox are being reported from different parts of Ontario.

A bill now before the P. E. I. legislature provides for the imposition of a tax of \$100 on every travelling insurance agent coming into this province.

The wife and five children of Alexander Terrien, of Tadoussac, were drowned at Murray Bay, P. Q., Wednesday, by the upsetting of a boat.

An April fools joke was played on Montreal lawyers, numbers of them receiving a letter from London asking them to meet a London lawyer arriv-

ing from New York by an early train. The lawyers took the bait, and some of them waited a considerable time for a Mr. Blickham who did not appear on the scene.

The house of Alex. McGinnis, near Fingal village, Ont., was burned on Wednesday. Twin babies seven months old perished in the flames. The mother was out gathering wood, and could not reach the house in time to save her children.

UNITED STATES.

Oranges are said to be rotting in Southern California for lack of railroad facilities to move the crop. This year's crop has been enormous, and the keeping qualities of the oranges is not so good as usual.

The relations between the U. S. government and the Venezuelan government are extremely strained. Why do not the Venezuelans recall 1896?

Charles F. Jones, secretary and valet to the late William Marshall Rice, New York millionaire, has confessed under oath that he had ended the life of his employer and benefactor with chloroform. The confession laid bare the details of a conspiracy which had for its object the seizure of \$3,000,000 in cash and negotiable securities and the conversion of \$3,000,000 in realty to the uses of the alleged chief conspirator. Jones said the crime was committed at the instigation and direction of Albert T. Patrick, a New York lawyer.
