## News of the Week

### NEW BRUNSWICK

The cottages of Rev. G. M. Ballentine, Rev. G. W. McDonald and Captain Charles Gorman at Brown's Flats have been broken into. Since the summer visitors departed from the "Flats" every cottage there has been looted and more or less wrecked. The executive of the Reformed Baptist Alliance offer a reward for the names of the people who penetrated the outrages.

Jeremiah Collins, aged about thirty-five, was killed Monday evening of last week by falling from the elevated bridge that spans the railway near the foot of Dorchester street, St. John.

Hampton ratepayers will ask for legislation to issue \$1500 debentures to provide fire apparatus and outfit.

Wednesday Dr. March, quarantine officer, removed to Partridge Island the sixteen persons who arrived in St. John among the immigrants on the steamer Lake Superior suffering with measles, also the members of their families. They are mostly Jews.

The first heavy snow-storm of the season began Tuesday night and continued till Wednesday night. There was a heavy snow fall; the wind blew and there was a good deal of drifting. Trains were delayed on all the lines Wednesday.

At Bathurst Mr. Harry Rogers died of lock-jaw. It was caused by stepping on a nail, which penetrated his foot. Two weeks later lock-jaw set in.

The smallpox record in St. John for last week is not nearly so encouraging as was that of the week before. Seventeen new cases have been located; and there were two deaths—an infant on Wednesday, and Thos. Givan, aged 60, Saturday.

A man named Frank Rush, who had been working in St. John, came to his home in St. Marys a few days ago, not very well. His case has been declared small pox.

He and the family are quarantined at home.

A report has been circulated recently to the effect that mineral ore of different varieties have lately been discovered on Grand Manan island.

and ask if they would unite in a memorial to the federal government favoring the transfer of the management of the Intercolonial Railway Company, provided such arrangements could be made with that company as would, while retaining government ownership of the road, promote local traffic and lead to the extensive development of Canada in export and import business through the ports of Quebec, St. John, Halifax and Sydney.

A resolution was also passed urging upon the dominion government the necessity of establishing a fast steamship service.

Thomas Colvis, 20 years of age, employed at the coke ovens Sydney Mines met with death Tuesday. While engaged in removing some pressed slack that was not discharging freely, a quantity of the material, estimated at thirty tons, came upon him completely burying him. Some hours elapsed before he was taken out.

Bliss Island Light, Bay of Fundy, is to be changed on January 15th from a fixed red to a fixed white. Abbott Harbor light, Yarmouth county, will in future be kept in operation all the year round. Six beacons have been established in Canning river to show the channel to the village of Canning.

St. Mary's Bay, N. S., is defined to be outside of the prohibited area and 9 inch lobsters may be taken there. At Parrsboro, Martin Anderson, a sailor on board the schooner, Gertie, while assisting to dock the schooner, was crushed between the schooners Levuka and Gertie, and had the bones of both hips broken.

There are now being surveyed in Nova Scotia three or four railways—the coast road from Yarmouth to Halifax, the road from Windsor Junction to Mulgrave through Musquodoboit etc., and the road from Canso to Louisburg. There is also the promise of a road from Truro through Earl town to Brule, and of a road from Middletown to Victoria Beach.

OTHER PROVINCES The C. P. R. land sales for the month of November amounted to 15,192,289 acres for \$512,862.94.

The gigantic barns and cattle sheds of Scutten and Tate, the great farmers of Windsor, Ont., were destroyed by fire Tuesday. Loss \$30,000.

Piano workers in nine Toronto factories threaten to leave unless they get nine hours a day and a scale running from 20 cents to 27 1/2 cents an hour.

A canoe, containing a man, two women and three children was capsized in Vancouver harbor. The man and one woman were drowned.

The other woman, seizing a child under her arm and grasping the infant in her teeth succeeded in swimming ashore. The children, however, succumbed to the effects of exposure.

J. W. McRae who accidentally shot himself in Ottawa a few days ago, was one of the most heavily insured citizens of Ottawa. The sum of both life and accident is \$171,000.

On Friday a Canadian Pacific freight train was running slowly around a dangerous curve, 400 feet above the Fraser River, when Engineer Randall saw a rockslide scarcely fifty yards ahead of him. He reversed his locomotive, but it was too late.

Before the engineer and fireman could jump the locomotive rolled over and over 300 feet down the bluff to the river. Engineer Randall and fireman Petrucci were crushed to death beneath the locomotive. Three cars were wrecked.

Two young people—Miss Bessie Blair, daughter of Hon. A. G. Blair, and Mr. H. A. Hasper, assistant editor of the Labour Gazette—were drowned in the Ottawa river Friday afternoon. There was a skating party on the river. Miss Bessie Blair and Mr. H. Creelman were skating together. They broke through the ice.

Mr. Harper, who was skating with Miss Snowball, went to the assistance of the young man and woman. He was able to assist Mr. Creelman out but lost his own life trying to save Miss Blair.

The sad occurrence cast a gloom over the city; and much sympathy is expressed for the parents and family.

## UNITED STATES

At Dover, Me., Wednesday, a verdict of murder was returned against Henry Lambert, a young French-Canadian woodsman.

The crime was a triple murder. The victims were J. Wesley Allen a prominent farmer of Shirley, his wife, and their daughter, aged 16. The murders were committed Sunday evening, May 12, and the murderers set fire to the farm buildings in an effort to cover up the crime.

More than 6,000 acres of coal land in the peninsula of Alaska, just south of Behing Se., has been purchased from the United States government by Pittsburg investors.

## BRITISH AND FOREIGN

In a railroad collision near Kharbin Russia, 18 Chinese and seven Russians were killed. Two of the latter were frozen to death.

It is thought by officials that London is probably in for a heavy epidemic of small-pox and for a great expense in attending with it. Since Aug 10, there had been 864 cases notified and there had been 141 deaths from the disease. During the past fortnight 262 fresh cases had been reported.

A despatch from Bombay says that during the celebration of the feast of St. Francis Xavier, December 3, at the Portuguese City of Goa (on the west coast of India) the sinking of a launch resulted in the drowning of 140 devotees.

A despatch from the Cameroons, West Africa, says that a merchant named Wittenberg has been sentenced to five years in the penitentiary there for impaling a negro on a ramrod. A merchant named Keltenich has also been sentenced to three years in the penitentiary for pouring petroleum on a negro's head and then setting him on fire. Another merchant, named Haesloep, has been sentenced to eight months in jail for destroying the eye of a negro chief with a whip.
