News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK

A new plaster quarry is being developed at Hillsboro, A. Co., It is owned by Messrs King, of New York.

William Yates, a respected farmer of Upper Dorchester, dropped dead at his home Wednesday morning. He was about eighty years of age.

At the investigation into the causes of Lillie May Causton's death in St. John before Coroner Berryman Thursday evening, the jury decided that the Causton child died of tetanus, caused by the use of impure vaccine. While they believed that every precaution was taken they recommended that the operation in no case should be performed except by a certified medical practitioner. The doctors do not agree with the jury as to the impure vaccine.

There are some cases of diphtheria at Gibson and St. Mary's, and it has been deemed necessary to shut the school on that account.

Mr. Cudlip, who has been superintendent of the Marysville Cotton Mills, is to take charge of the St. John Mills.

The direct telephone line between St. John and St. Stephen was completed last week. It is 100 miles long.

The logs in the St. John river above Fredericton are apparently frozen in for the winter. There are about 10,000,000 feet between Grand Falls and Fredericton, 10,000,000 feet above Grand Falls and 6,000,000 feet in the Aroostook. The Douglas boom has been taken in.

The new steam hay press at McAdam Junction began its work Nov. 20th under the management of the New Brunswick Hay Co.

The lifeless body of Patrick Sinnott was found in the woods at Chapel Grove, K. Co., about a mile from his home, Thursday. He had gone out Monday to cut an axe handle. He was 86 years old. He died from exposure.

Alphonse LeBlanc, travelling passenger agent I. C. R., was found to have smallpox, and is in quarantine near Campbellton.

NOVA SCOTIA

The sail of the Duck and Yarn Co. of Yarmouth has taken place. Charles T. Grantham becomes managing owner. The capital stock is \$150,000 paid up. The purchasers give \$300,000 for this and all the assets of the company, including \$30,000 stock. The mills will be run as usual.

On Friday John A. McCarthy for causing the death of Charles McAulay at Pugwash, on Oct. 31, was found guilty of manslaughter. At the request of counsel for the prisoner sentence was reserved for one week.

It is reported that the car which contained the two quarantined smallpox sailors on the D. A. R. at Meteghan, was taken by the railway to Kentville to be renovated. The Kentville people decided there was a better way, so it was set on fire a few nights ago.

There was a \$2000 fire at W. Gurry & Son's factory, Windsor, on Wednesday.

William Murphy, deaf and dumb, was killed at Elmsdale by railway train.

It is said that one of the shafts of the Dominion Coal Co., C. B., is the largest in the world. The output of coal will be about 2000 tons a day. The shaft is 911 feet deep.

The headquarters of the Midland Railway has been established at Truro. Admiral Bedford some time ago recommended the admiralty to place a training ship at Halifax. This recommendation, it is announced, has been acted upon, and a ship will be placed on the North American station next spring.

The Nova Scotia Telephone company are extending their lines from New Glasgow to the Strait, where they hope to connect with the telephone system in Cape Breton, and thus give direct telephone communication between the Sydneys and Halifax.

Andrew Carnegie offers Yarmouth \$4,000 for a library on condition that the town spends \$1,900 annually in maintenance.

Wednesday, in J. & M. Murphy's building, Halifax, the elevator fell two stories, carrying two employes, Grant and Nehley, to the basement. Grant's leg was broken and Nehley was hurt about the head and his jaw broken, and both were injured internally.

OTHER PROVINCES

The census department gives greater Ottawa, which includes Hull, a population of 82,546. Municipal Toronto is given a population of 208,000.

Montreal despatch: Smallpox is still raging in many cities and towns of the province of Quebec. There are over fifty centres of population where the disease is.

James Ryan was blown to pieces by the explosion of five thousand pounds of dynamite, which he was drying at Helen mine, Michipicoten, Ont., on Thursday. The explosion was heard a distance of thirteen miles.

There are seventy cases of smallpox in the city of Quebec.

Owing to the prevalence of diphtheria in Charlottetown, P. E. I., the schools have been closed.

The Montreal health officials have notified the heads of public schools that all pupils must be vaccinated. A doctor stated that people were going about Quebec with sores on their faces imagining that they were merely pimples or a rash. Some days ago a man went into a drug shop and asked for salve for pimples on his face. A physician who happened to be in pronounced his trouble smallpox.

UNITED STATES

Patrick Mulhern, an eccentric Irishman living alone in East Sullivan, Me., was robbed of between \$3000 and \$10,000 a few nights ago.

Wednesday a wreck occurred on the Santa Fe railroad near Fraconia, Ariz., by which seven trainmen were killed and three passengers and 14 trainmen injured. Limited trains east and west bound, crashed together while running at full speed.

It is estimated by authorities that the Aroostook potato yield this year will reach figures at least thirty per cent. larger than last year. The entire crop, including potatoes for export, the starch factories and home consumption, is estimated to be between 10,000,000 and 15,000,000 bushel.

Nearly a hundred men were probably suffocated to death in the Smuggler union mine in Marshal Basin, Colorado, as the result of fire which consumed the building at the mouth of the Bullion tunnel. Twenty two miners are known to be dead and scores of others are either dead or seeking safety in remote parts of the mine until the place shall be cleared of foul gases and smoke.

Although the last Maine legislature passed a law imposing a penalty of imprisonment and fine for negligence or carelessness which should result in the shooting of a human being by hunters, the record of such fatalities in the state during the present season is very heavy. Twelve persons have been shot by accident, and five of the victims have been either killed outright or wounded so that death followed. Thus far no steps have been taken towards prosecution.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

Cholera has broken out at Socra, baya, E. I., and is spreading. From 100 to 120 cases are reported daily.

The winter has now thoroughly set in throughout Northern Russia and the Neva is frozen over.

In Germany the tariff war continues. There are serious disturbances in Spain.

The voters of Galway, Ireland, have elected Col. Lynch, a pro-Boer warrior, to represent them in the Imperial Parliament.

The smallpox epidemic which has prevailed in London, Eng., for several weeks is spreading seriously. There are 405 cases of the disease.

The largest sugar refinery in Italy, at Sampierdarena, was burned yesterday. It is estimated that enough sugar to supply 5,000,000 people for a year was destroyed.

The report of the lieutenant governor of British New Guinea for the last year, states that owing to the introduction of whooping cough by two white children, lives innumerable have been, and are still, being sacrificed. The malady has swept the coast and is now ravaging the interior.

Miss Nellie Churchill, Yarmouth, dropped dead on the street a few days ago.

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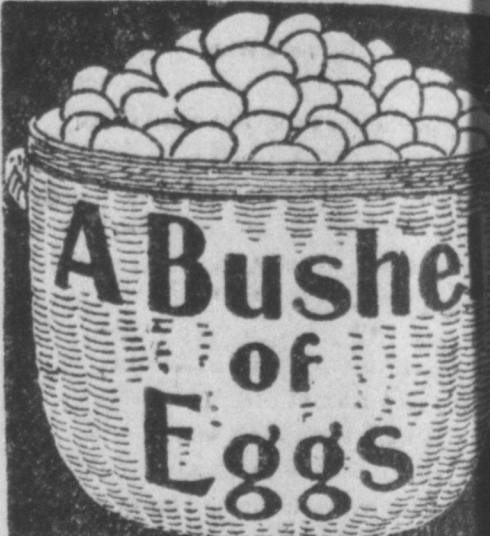
