Argus.

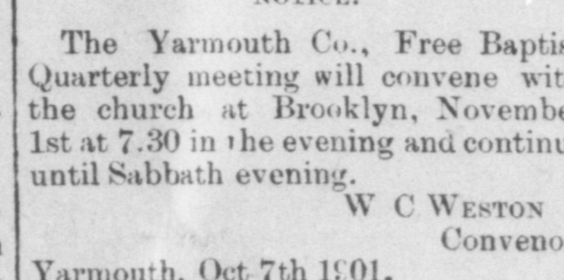
