Action has been filed in the Supreme Court in an action of libel against D. G. Smith, editor of the Chatham Advance, at the suit of Dr. Philip Cox.

The Central Railway is still blocked, with little chance of its running for some weeks.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Norman McDonald a brakeman on the Sydney and Louisburg Railway, died on the 6th inst. from the effects of injuries sustained by being caught between two cars while coupling.

Friday, fire destroyed the dwelling of Thomas Eisenhauer at Little Jo g n Bridge. The inmates of the house were all attending church. Nothing was saved; no insurance.

The homestead of the late Godfrey Peart, Glasgow with all its contents was burned to the ground on Sunday morning before daybreak.

In the Legislature Wednesday Premier Murray brought down the financial returns, showing the revenue for the year closed December 31, to have been \$1,014,000, and expenditures \$937,000.

John Ambrose Pace was before Stipendiary Fielding at Halifax charged with bigamy.

The Halifax Herald says that the fact that A. M. Whitney is about to build a residence for himself at Sydney, is sustained evidence of the permanence of the Steel Works.

The output at the Dominion Iron Works Sydney, C. B., is gradually increasing. The furnace is working splendidly.

The following have been appointed justices of the peace.—Bruce V. Knott of Merigomish; John J. Whitrow, of South Upland; and Clarence W. Anderson, of Sherbrooke.

The Sydney school board intend asking for a grant of \$10,000 for two new schools in the centre of suburban districts.

The Harris Abattoir company, with a capital of \$1,000,000, has been formed in Toronto, to deal in dressed meats for Canadian and English markets.

There are different ways, and Mr. and Mrs. Way, of Weyerton, Manitoba, have a new way. I fact they have two, as Mrs. Way presented her husband with twins the other day.

Andrew Carnegie has offered to give \$50,000 for a free public library to the city of Vancouver, providing that the city would give a site for the building and \$5,000 a year for its maintenance.

The Orangemen of the Toronto district are angry at the passage of the Coronation Oath resolution in parliament and have decided to oppose Messrs Kemp and McLean, M. P.'s if they offer for re-election.

Counterfeit \$2 Dominion bills bearing King Edward's head are in circulation in Toronto. The counterfeiting is rough and easily detected and the bills are of smaller size than the genuine articles.

The office of the Peterboro Ont., Examiner was burned Saturday, loss thirty-five thousand dollars. Insurance, fifteen thousand.

UNITED STATES.

Thomas J. Burns, despondent, as he says over his inability to obtain employment, killed his young wife, to whom he had been married less than two months, by cutting her throat with a razor in South Boston on Tuesday. He also badly wounded his mother-in-law. Burns is in custody.

The superintendent of the Dubuque division of the Chicago Great Western Railroad Company has issued a sweeping order to all its employees. In effect it prohibits them from using intoxicating liquor in any form or at any time.

The building occupied by the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company, New York division for the general offices, at Willis avenue and 32nd street, was damaged by fire Tuesday night.

A big storm Saturday and Sunday did much damage in the South and West.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

The British steamer Avions, 1,140 tons, Captain Lennox was wrecked at the Bilbao breakwater, Thursday. All on board were lost.

The census returns show the city of Bombay has 770,000 inhabitants, a decrease of over 50,000 in ten years, mainly due to the exodus of the past two months on account of the plague.

PARLIAMENT.

MONDAY.—Mr. Ganong ascertained that during the winter of 1900 and 1901 the following amount of grain passed the St. John Intercolonial elevator: Wheat, 7,836 tons; corn, 4,436 tons; barley, 327 tons; rye, 263 tons; peas, 545 tons; oatmeal (bags), 198 tons.

Mr. Davis submitted a motion and came out strong for railway control by government commission. He favored public ownership, if possible.

After considerable discussion, Mr. Davies' motion carried.

The report of the experimental farm was laid on the table. TUESDAY.—Premier Laurier announced that the supplementary estimates will be brought down next week; also government bills to amend the Dominion Franchise Act, Alien Labor Law and Dominion Election Act.

The Pacific cable bill was taken up. The cost of the cable will be £1,795,000. The company have a contract which must be completed by December 31st, 1902.

The house went into supply to consider the public works estimates.

The house adjourned at 12.30, after passing several items for public works and supplementary estimate for the Paris exposition.

WEDNESDAY.—Mr. Fowler was informed that 31 men have been dismissed from the Intercolonial shops at Moncton since November 7th.

Mr. Bennet moved that in the opinion of the house the time has arrived when a fixed and definite line of action should be undertaken on the question of the transportation of grain, with a view to centering the same in Canadian channels.

Mr. Dobell announced the government's policy to be any route for trade. Several amending acts to the dominion election act brought out the weakness of the ballot law.

THURSDAY.—Premier Laurier introduced a bill to amend the alien labor law. It provides for a penalty of not less than \$50 or more than \$1,000 for all violations of the law.

The debate on Mr. Bennet's motion for improving Canadian trade was resumed.

Mr. McDonald favored the improvement of Canadian waterways at any expense. He showed that thousands of dollars were annually lost by lack of facilities for loading cattle.

Mr. Blair defended gifts to the Grand Trunk for Intercolonial purposes. He contended that they were payments for value received, and that it would have been ridiculous for the government to attach any condition to the agreement preventing the building up of American ports.

Mr. Bennett, withdrew the motion with the expressed hope that the government would do something to save Canada's interests.
