When a question came before him, either in Conference debate or social discourse, he would grasp the situation and take a comprehensive view of the whole case, and form his opinion with such precision as seldom to have occasion to change it. He generally took time to turn a subject over in his mind before expressing an opinion, and ordinarily it was safe to accept his decision. He was not a prodigy; he was a plodder. By reading and thinking he accumulated a stock of mental riches which few, even among the brilliant, possess. He thought for himself, and in expression was always new and original. In temperament he was mild and ur assum ing, often to his own disadvantage. He exemplified the truth of the Wise man's remark, "Better is he that ruleth his spirit than he that taketh a city."
