NEW BRUNSWICK

The creamery which was operated at Andover, last season by J. C. Mazer, is to be run by a joint stock company to be styled the Andover Creamery Company Ltd., with a capital of \$10,000.

Louis Bertrand, the tramp who broke into several summer-houses at Westfield, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

Mr. F. St. John Bliss was elected Secretary-Treasurer of York Co. last week, in place of Mr. John Black, left the Province.

September 17th and the three following days have been decided upon as the date of the provincial exhibition at Fredericton. A large building is to be erected.

A post office has been established at Bocabec Cove, Charlotte county. The Little River (Elgin) post office in Albert county has had the name changed to Parkindale, and the post office at Limekiln, York county, has been closed.

NOVA SCOTIA.

A sad drowning accident at Central Grove, Long Island, occurred Thursday morning. Five young men were out in a small boat getting a mooring. About twenty-five yards from the shore the boat capsized and four were drowned. One drifted ashore on the boat. The names of the drowned were Wm. Powell, Charles Stanton Orbin Elliott Arthur Shaw.

A vicious bull-dog in Truro Wednesday attacked a little girl and a boy, both were badly bitten.

At Digby, Frank Goudy, for stealing \$150 from a lumber camp at New Tuskent, was sentenced to six months in jail.

The Kentville small pox embargo has been lifted. The churches and schools have been reopened. Some of Kentville's citizens think there never was any small pox there.

At Anherst, Tuesday, Camelle G. Fisher, charged with shooting Murdoch Cutliffe and Leon Rockwell, was discharged by Justice Morse. The prisoner pleaded self-defense, and this plea, was held sufficient. The judge instructed the prosecuting attorney that he should bring Fisher before the proper authority and have him fined for carrying firearms without license.

Tuesday of last week at the penitentiary, Basil Blois fell from a ladder fracturing his skull. He died next day. Blois was eighteen years of age, and was a native of Canning.

Walter Murphy, proprietor of the Mayflower hotel, Yarmouth was convicted Friday of four offences against the Scott act and was fined \$50 and costs in each case. Four more charges against him will be tried.

A horrible accident occurred on the Sydney and Louisburg track near the coke ovens, Friday morning. Michael McDuggan to escape an approaching engine, stepped to another track and was killed instantly. The body was almost severed in two.

The late Hugh Cann of Yarmouth left a property worth over half a million. It was all bequeathed to his children.

In the Halifax civic elections, held Wednesday Mayor Mamilton was re-elected by 1,309 majority. The new aldermen are: Wm. Robertson, A. B. Crosby, and Andrew Lamphier.

The six years old daughter of Chas. Fulton, Stewiacke was burned to death Saturday. Her clothes caught from some rubbish fires.

At Sydney, Friday, fire destroyed two tar tanks belonging to the Dominion Iron and Steel Company, and containing 32,000 gallons of tar each. The damage is estimated at \$15,000. Three men were injured.

Schooner Willie D., with plaster for Bowdoinham, Maine, from Chevorie, sprung a leak off Refuge Cove Saturday morning and sank. Crew saved; small insurance.

It is announced that the Imperial authorities have decided to erect a new barracks and to construct other important works in Halifax this summer. The military have also in view the construction of a fort that will exceed in proportions York Redoubt, which is second only to the one at Gibraltar. It is stated that the new fort will be located at or near Sambro and will be superior in armament and extent to any fortress in America and second to none in the world.

OTHER PROVINCES

Eighteen cases of small pox have broken out in Farnham, Que. The disease, it is believed, was brought by a family recently returned from the New England States.

The smallpox situation on the Ontario Indian reserve has become more serious. Two of the first five patients are not likely to recover, and two additional cases have developed. Indications point to a serious spreading of the disease.

The sealing steamer Terra Nova returned from the ice floes and landed her cargo 42,000 seals the heaviest for many years at St. Johns Nfld.

The flour mill of Baxter, Galloway & Co. and the private bank of R. D. Baxter at Burlington, Ont., were burned on Friday; loss twenty-five thousand dollars; insured.

UNITED STATES

According to official returns small-pox is fearfully prevalent throughout the United States. During the period from December 28th last to April 12th there were 13,269 cases and 1,999 deaths. Since January 1st last there have also been 12 deaths from bubonic plague at San Francisco.

At Portland, Me., on Wednesday in the building of the New England Telephone Company, Geo. H. Brainerd, foreman electrician, while chatting with fellow workmen, suddenly whipped out a revolver and opened fire on the party. He killed two men and probably fatally wounded two others. He also made an attempt to kill the officer who arrested him.

Recent floods caused an immense amount of damage in sections of Pennsylvania, Ohio, New York, Tennessee, West Virginia, Kentucky and other states. Millions of dollars would not pay for the damage done.

Tuesday night a mob of 100 men forcibly entered the court house at Springfield, Tenn., took Mallory, a negro and hanged him, and each member of the mob fired a shot into the body. Mallory had fatally wounded a white man.

Many hundreds of families in the Ohio Valley have been made homeless by the floods.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The Canary Islands have been swept by a cyclone, killing 12 persons and doing great damage to property.

A cyclone has swept over Paraguay, destroying one town.

Eighteen miners were killed and seven were injured, Saturday, by an explosion of fire damp in the Grand Buizon coal mine at Hornu, Belgium.

A slight earthquake was felt at Rome and in Southern Italy, Wednesday. A slight earthquake shock was felt at Lisbon and a violent shock was experienced at Algarvo, during which several persons were thrown down and bruised.

The German war office has the following advices from Count Von Waldsee: 'Pekin, April 27.—Three engagements occurred April 23, and a fourth April 24, at the great wall, between four columns under Gen. Ketteler and the Chinese troops under Gen. Liu. The Chinese were everywhere defeated, and after a stubborn resistance were forced back over the wall, being pursued as far as Ku Kuan. Our casualties were four officers wounded and three men killed and thirty-two wounded. The French troops were not engaged.'

It is estimated that the £30,000,000 of the new British loan offered to the public has already been covered five times. Fifty million dollars of the loan has been placed in the United States.

One of the most disastrous explosions on record occurred on Thursday at the electric chemical works near Greisheim, Germany, where smokeless powder is manufactured. Most of the boilers exploded. The factory immediately became a mass of flames, and a northwest wind carried sparks to neighboring villages, where several houses were also set on fire. Eighteen cylinders, each containing about one hundred weight of smokeless powder, were in the room where the explosion occurred. It is feared that nearly two hundred persons have been killed or injured.
