A terrible gun accident occurred on board the British battleship Royal Sovereign outside of Astako harbor, Greece. An artilleryman forgot to close the breech before the gun was men were killed outright, and the captain and 13 sailors were seriously injured.

Last week, a terrible gale and snow storm, lasting for 12 hours, did great damage throughout Denmark. Eight vessels were driven ashore, two were wrecked and many lives were lost.

A furious gale which swept over England last week did immense damage. It is not possible yet to give an accurate statement of the loss of life and property. Tons of wreckage of unidentified vessels are still being thrown up. Altogether it is known that some fifty vessels have been wreck ed along the British coasts. Thirtyfour of these have been absolute wrecks, involving, it is believed, a loss of more than 180 drowned. The Yarmouth lifeboat disaster alone leaves 44 fatherless children.




