News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

The Fredericton W. C. T. U. has petitioned the Attorney General for a full and searching enquiry into the circumstances surrounding the death of the late Col. Hewitson.

Fredericton will get \$2,500 of the \$5,000 grant authorized last session for assistance of exhibitions and agricultural societies. The balance will be apportioned as follows: Sussex, \$500; Carleton county, \$800; Madawaska, \$500; Westmorland, \$500.

At Woodstock last week Harry McLean, who did not come home from Africa with the rest of the South Africa quota, was presented by the Town Council with a gold watch similar to that given his companions.

At the meeting of the Board of Education at Fredericton Wednesday afternoon the communication recently received from Mr. Sargent, director of the school system in South Africa, was considered. The government expressed approval of the idea of allowing teachers to go to South Africa to assist in organizing a school system, and are willing to grant any teachers who may desire to go leave of absence.

Bank of New Brunswick agencies at Campbellton and Sussex will be opened about June 1.

At the shingle mill at Marysville Tuesday of last week a workman named Robert McCoy was thrown against the large circular saw and his right arm was completely severed below the elbow.

On the Mountain Road two miles from Moncton, Thursday, a three years old child of Smith Brown jr. was burned to death. The mother was out for water, the child playing with matches set fire to its clothes.

At a special meeting of the Carleton Co., Council, Friday, to deal with the

question of a new jail, it was voted to build it at Woodstock, instead of at Upper Woodstock where the old one was.

The passenger car of a train on the Elgin Branch Railway went through a bridge Wednesday afternoon half a mile from Elgin. Dr. Colter, P. O., Inspector, who was one of the passengers, was quite seriously hurt. The latest report is that he will be recovered in a few weeks.

The Moncton Street Railway Company will tear up the rails of their road in consequence of the city refusing to take over the plant and franchise for \$12,000. The rails and plant have been sold to parties outside the city.

The bridge which crosses the Hammond River at Smithtown, K. Co., collapsed on Saturday forenoon as a heavy boiler was being hauled across. The bridge was considered unsafe and the horses were unhitched and taken across to the other side and a line fastened to the sloop. When the sloop was nicely on the bridge the stringers gave way and all went to the bottom.

News from the head waters is discouraging. It is said scarcely any of last winter's lumber cut is yet in safe waters. Those in a position to know, say that 90,000,000 feet of lumber is in danger of being hung up.

The Fredericton Exhibition Association has difficulties and there is doubt whether the proposed fair will be held. The grants from the city and government are less than expected, and the owners of the site for the proposed new buildings will not insert a renewal clause in the lease.

Councilor Alanson McNally, of Queensbury, died Friday night after two weeks' illness of Bright's disease. Deceased was 64 years old.

W. S. Macintosh, book-keeper with

the Todd Gold Mining Company, was found dead on the road side, a mile from Bridgewater Wednesday due to heart disease. It is thought he fell out of his team while driving along.

Alfred Lynds, aged 13, son of Wm. Lynds, of North River, while cleaning a barn was kicked by a horse in the forehead. His skull was seriously fractured.

It is said that the directors of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company and the directors of the Dominion Coal Company at Sydney this week will arrange an amalgamation of the companies. The deal will be in the nature of the coal company selling out to the other company.

In Halifax Friday morning, Captain W. H. Smith, R. N. R., was found dead in bed when the servant took his breakfast up to his room. He had been ill for a few days.

Truro foundry is building a 100 ton cyanide plant at Cariboo Mines for the extraction of gold from trailings.

Seven new cases of smallpox are reported from Kentville all in the house of a Mr. Webster.

The syndicate that has bought out the Nova Scotia Steel Company is said to be headed by J. Pierpont Morgan. The price asked for the Nova Scotia Steel Company's property was \$5,000,000, the forfeit money being \$150,000. The money is divided as follows: For the Sydney coal mines property \$3,000,000, for the Ferrona and Trenton iron and steel works \$1,000,000 and \$1,000,000 for the Wabana iron areas.

Measles is epidemic in Springhill, and the schools are almost emptied. About 200 cases are reported, with several deaths. Typhoid fever also lingers in town.

At the Dickie mill, Lower Stewiacke Saturday morning, Silas Potten was killed. He was assisting to load a car of wood at the time of the accident. He is supposed to have fallen off the car and broke his neck.

OTHER PROVINCES.

The cotton business seems to be booming. The Montreal Cotton Company announces that it will build two new cotton mills at Valleyfield Quebec which when completed will give employment to over 600 hands.

Two brothers, James Macpherson and Robert Clare Almond, aged twenty-five and fifteen respectively, were drowned at Gaspe, P. Q. while rounding the point in a small boat.

The Newfoundland seal fishery returns are valued at \$600,000. Happily this season no one engaged in the fisheries perished.

Ex-Lieutenant Governor Howlan, of P. E. I., died on Saturday.

UNITED STATES.

The little village of Kendall, Mass., was almost completely destroyed by fire Monday night. Loss \$40,000.

The Massachusetts legislature has passed the bill making it illegal to sell or to give cigarettes to boys under 18 years of age.

The heaviest storm of hail in years visited Selma, Ala., on Monday. Stones the size of birds' eggs fell and remained on the ground about forty minutes, damaging young corn and cotton.

The explosion of the boiler of a freight engine on the Huntington, Penn. R. R. Friday, killed four men.

Sunday fire swept the west bank of the Rouge river in Delray, a suburb, to the south of Detroit for three-quarters of a mile and destroyed over \$800,000 worth of property.

At Cambridge, Mass., after one of the longest trials in the annals of the state, Chas. R. Eastman was on Saturday acquitted of the charge of murdering his brother-in-law, Richard H. Grogan, jr.

John Glancy, of Houlton committed suicide Thursday by shooting himself with a Winchester rifle, the ball passing through his heart. He was forty-six years of age, and besides a wife leaves two children.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

Heavy rains have caused a great rise in the river Indus, India, and Dera Ghazee Khan, capital of the same name is in imminent danger of destruction by flood. The banks of the river are held with great difficulty.

It is now assumed that Lord Salisbury will continue Premier till after the King's coronation; that is if his health should permit. Mr. Chamberlain is not likely to leave the Colonial Office till the South African troubles are settled.

Saturday the Odelsting (the lower house of the Norwegian parliament) adopted by a vote of 48 to 36 a bill introducing universal communal male suffrage and by 68 to 17 votes adopted a bill providing communal suffrage for women paying taxes on an income of at least 300 crowns.

SOUTH AFRICAN NOTES.

Lord Kitchener reports the capture of another hundred Boers, one twelve-pounder, one nine-pounder, one Maxim and a quantity of ammunition. He has secured 25,000 horses in Cape Colony since December.

The Boer prisoners number about 18,000. Some are in St. Helena, some in Ceylon, and some are to come to Bermuda.

Sir Alfred Milner, addressing a mass meeting before leaving Capetown, said, there was absolutely no reason for the anxiety felt in some quarters lest any change be introduced in South Africa that would in any way weaken the imperial policy. Such a change was impossible; Great Britain would carry out the policy she has laid down.

A number of Boers are removing to German Africa; the German Government places them under severe restrictions. Over 20,000 Boers are kept in refugee camps. There are 26 American prisoners of war in British hands. They will not be released till the war is over. Many Boers are giving up the fight.

Lord Kitchener reports to the war office under date of Pretoria, May 10, as follows: "Since May 5th, 27 Boers have been killed, six wounded, 130 taken prisoners and 183 have surrendered. Nine thousand rounds of ammunition, 230 wagons, 1,500 horses and large quantities of grain and stock have been captured."
