

MISSION NEWS AND NOTES.

There are 1,100 hospitals connected with Protestant missions in the world, treating over 2,500,000 patients yearly.

The Fijians were cannibals fifty years ago. Now they have collected themselves 50,000 rupees and awarded them to relieve the famine-stricken in India.

The native Christian community in South India has attained a population of 608,878. Of these 159,797 are communicants. Since 1878 the community has more than doubled, and communicants have grown three-hundred years ago who would have thought it possible? Towkiao is the name of a native king in New Zealand.

There are at present 17 German Protestant foreign missionary societies. They have 528 mission stations. The African society leads with 131 stations; the Woman's Missionary Society for China ends the list, with 1 station.

The Report of the Canadian Baptist Mission among the Te'ngus in 1900 contains reports of the various departments of the work. The report explains the obstacles, insuperable anything but divine power secured through faith, which confronts the missionaries at all points.

A Congregational missionary says: We now have a martyr church in China. Of our 700 Christians half have been chopped to pieces by the Boxers.
