**News of the Week.**

**NEW BRUNSWICK**

John Palmer, John Kilburn, C. K. Palmer, Sarah C. Palmer and Matilda Kilburn, all of Fredericton, are applying for incorporation as the "John Palmer Company, Ltd.," with a capital of \$75,000 in \$100 shares. The company is to carry on the larrigan and shoepack manufacturing business in Fredericton now conducted by Mr. John Palmer.

Edward Conway a C. P. R. brakeman lost his right arm by an accident at Fredericton Junction Monday of last week. He was climbing up one of the cars, when his hand slipped on the wet rung of the ladder and losing his balance he fell to the ground and his right arm, which laid across the rail, was crushed under the wheels. The hand was completely severed above the wrist and the arm was so mangled that amputation was necessary above the elbow.

McNair's saw mill at Nash's Creek, Restigouche Co., was destroyed by fire a few days ago. Loss \$3,000. No insurance.

Charles Ross, deputy warden of Dorchester penitentiary at a salary of \$1,500, aged 66 and appointed in 1867, has been superannuated, and A. B. Pipes, of Amherst, former instructor in the penitentiary at \$700 a year, has been promoted to Mr. Ross's place.

At Sussex Tuesday Andrew Black pleaded guilty to three charges of robbery: stealing ten bushels of barley and fourteen bushels of wheat from Andrew Forsyth; stealing three barrels of flour, one cross cut saw and some codfish, and with having induced certain parties to convey a stove to his residence which he knew was not his property. Black was committed for trial.

The jury enquiring into the death of W. C. Anslow, Newcastle, editor, whose remains were found in the woods a few days ago brought in a verdict that he came to his death by having lost his way in the woods and by exposure and not by any violent means.

Fire at Bucouche, Kent Co. Friday destroyed the stores of A. B. Cormier & J. F. Loised. Small insurance.

Penobscot P. O. was broken into early Sunday morning, but not much was secured. A man named Watson has been arrested on suspicion and is suspected.

The steel company have decided to erect two more blast furnaces at Sydney.

Another lot of Galicians (700) arrived at Halifax last Wednesday. They have gone to the Northwest.

Henry Keay and Thomas Carey, Guysboro, have been found guilty of manslaughter. They killed a man named O'Connor about three months ago. The parties had been drinking. They were sentenced to five years in the penitentiary.

Over 81,000 trees have been planted on Sable Island as an experiment. If these trees can withstand the salt sea gales, the island will yet become a place of peaceful habitations, safe and salubrious.

Urian Johnson, farmer and merchant of Port Phillip, between Amherst and Pugwash, committed suicide Thursday by hanging. He adjusted a rope to his neck attaching it to the bed-post, and deliberately sat down, strangling himself. He had shown symptoms of insanity for some time.

The carpenters of Halifax went on strike Saturday for 25 cents an hour and nine hour day. About 150 men are out. Three employers have granted the demand.

It is stated that the sale of the Yarmouth Steamship Company has been effected at from \$260,000 to \$265,000. to take effect Saturday next.

At Grand River, P. E. Island, Tuesday, Mrs. May, while drawing water from a brook, lost her balance and fell in and was drowned. She was an elderly lady and feeble.

At Tilsonburg, Ont., on Monday, two little boys, Harry Mann and James Adams, while playing with matches in their uncle's hay loft set fire to the hay and were burned to death.

Cod fishing at the French Islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon this year is the poorest on record. This is chiefly owing to the inability to procure bait; the Newfoundland bait act is being rigidly enforced.

**UNITED STATES**

At Barlow, Fla., Wednesday a negro 35 years of age who criminally assaulted and then murdered Mrs. Rena Taggart, a respectable white woman, was burned at the stake in the presence of a throng of people. The burning was on the scene of the negro's assault.

The long threatened general strike in the machine trade of Chicago and vicinity was ordered by the executive board of the local lodge of the machinist union Wednesday. The walkout effects over 7,000 men.

The long talked of pneumatic parcel tube from Boston to New York may be realized before long. At least, a company with \$5,000,000 alleged capital is asking for a charter.

Seven thousand machinists at Chicago have gone on strike. The safe in the post office at Andover, Mass., was blown up by burglars Tuesday morning and postage stamps and money to the amount of \$1,000 secured.

A pushcart loaded with 48 boxes of dynamite was struck by a freight train near Skyhomish, Washington. A terrific explosion followed. The engine was hurled some distance up the mountain side, three freight cars were

demolished and about 500 feet of track torn up.

Burglars are just now roaming through Maine, breaking into banks, post offices, railway stations and stores and plundering wherever they go.

Six persons overcome by gas were found Wednesday in their rooms in the Hotel Irvine, Chicago.

At Lincoln, R. I., Tuesday, in a fit of jealousy Wm. Matineau, killed his wife and himself.

**BRITISH AND FOREIGN**

A sensation has been caused at Birmingham by the discovery of thirty-one bodies of infants in a cellar beneath an undertaker's establishment. The bodies were in various stages of decomposition and huddled together in soap boxes. The establishment was conducted by a widow who is charged with causing the infants' deaths.

A newspaper published in Verona reports the attempted suicide of a youth named Pietrucci, who has confessed that he belonged to a society of anarchists and was chosen by lot to kill the Emperor of Germany. He preferred suicide to making the attempt. In his confession he also disclosed the names of certain of his comrades who had been selected to kill Queen Helena of Italy, President Loubet, of France, and the Czar of Russia.

The census returns for all Australia shows a population of 4,550,651, an increase of 740,756.

The Turkish government has issued orders prohibiting the entry of typewriters into Turkey.

The Chinese plenipotentiaries have informed the ministers of the powers that the court is willing to pay indemnity to the amount of 450,000,000 taels, but objects to four per cent interest. M. De Giers has announced that Russia agrees to the formation of a mixed commission such as is provided for in the British proposal.

The chief of these is the Canadian Magazine. Its cover pictures a stalwart young man having just completed the chiselling on a statue of the figures '100'. There are a number of general articles and stories such as, 'A Canadian in China'; 'A Canadian Negro V. C.', Robert Grant Haliburton; 'The number contains 108 pages of reading matter and seventy illustrations, and is something which may be treasured by patriotic and educated citizens.

The Century for June is a College Number, the opening paper being on 'Working One's Way Through College'. Timeliest of the magazine's contents is the paper on 'The Young Men's Christian Association in Europe', with special reference to the relations thereto of the American Y. M. C. A., which celebrates this month its semi-centennial. Mr. Carnegie's 'Gospel of Wealth' is made the text of an editorial on 'Multimillionaires in Thinking-Caps.' 'The Fremantle' is the hero of the current chapter on 'Creeps of Danger and Daring.' 'Wild Flowers I Have Known'—the Dug-Wood, the Tiger-Lily, the Dandelion, etc.—are sung in humorous verse, with illustrations.

Africa is the subject of three articles in The Missionary Review of the World for June. The leading article is by the editor, Dr. Pierson, who tells the inspiring story of some of the prominent converts of the Missionary Century. There are other timely readable articles.
