NEW BRUNSWICK

Reports from the upper St. John are to the effect that the river had not risen sufficiently to enable anything worth speaking of to be done to the logs, now high and dry. It will take a rise of four feet anyway, and the rain only raised the river two feet. Lumber is piled up high ont of the waster on the Aroostook Falls.
