News of the Week

NEW BRUNSWICK

Working for J. J. Hale in Faulkner's camp, Tobique, a few days ago Charles Darral was struck with a skid and sustained injuries from which he died.

Colonel Loggie, of the crown land department, Fredericton, has received an offer from the Canadian Pacific Railway Company to enter their land office at Winnipeg—the salary is \$4,000.

At Woodstock, Tuesday, the jury in the Kirkpatrick vs. C. P. R. case returned a verdict that Dr. Kirkpatrick's condition resulted from his injuries and assessed the damages for \$3,500.

James Gibson, of Marysville, has assigned to Sheriff Sterling.

At St. Andrews, Wednesday, the barns of Joseph McCullough, together with their contents, were burned.

Patrick McLaughlin, fishery guardian of St. George, has been appointed by the government to collect fishery statistics for a census in Charlotte county.

At Sussex Wednesday the bakery of James Smith, with contents, was burned. Partially insured.

The editor of the Maritime Homestead, who made a visit to Charlotte county says the fishing season drawing to a close has been a remarkably good one for the weir fishermen of the county, and the same factories have been unable some days to handle the immense quantities of fish offered.

The New Brunswick Telephone Company's line being constructed between St. John and St. Stephen is nearing completion. The distance is ninety miles.

Fire in Linton & Sinclair's crockery establishment on Dock street St. John Thursday did damage to the extent of over two thousand dollars.

Samuel Landry while driving down a hill to the railway at Memramcook a few days ago, was struck and killed by the C. P. R. Express.

Diphtheria has broken out again at Hatfield's Point, Kings county.

Mr. L. Sprague, Hatfield's Point, K. Co. died of smallpox on Tuesday of last week. He contracted the disease in St. John, where he had been for a day about ten days before he became ill.

Two deaths from smallpox occurred in St. John last week. There have been no new cases reported for a week, and it is now hoped there will be no more.

NOVA SCOTIA

The Digby Board of Health has decided that all passengers from St. John by the bay steamer must hereafter produce certificates of successful vaccination, or be vaccinated before landing.

As the result of a Halloween row a Pugwash, Charles McAulay is dead and John McCarty is under arrest charged with stabbing him.

At North Sydney, Tuesday, fire destroyed Voight Brothers building and stock. Loss estimated at \$120,000; insurance \$50,000.

Mrs. James Smith was struck by a train at the railway crossing at Merigonish Thursday and instantly killed.

It is stated in C. P. R. circles, says the Winnipeg Telegram, that the steamer Yarmouth, running between Halifax and Boston, will be purchased by the C. P. R. company to replace the lost steamer Islander.

The piggery of John Morse, at Amherst, was completely destroyed by fire, Wednesday night. The fire is supposed to have caught from the furnace. Loss \$600.

A statement of the expenditure in Halifax shows that the city expended \$2,984.73 out of an appropriation of \$3,000 for entertaining the Duke of Cornwall, so that it had a balance on hand.

The Sons of Temperance in Nova Scotia number 11,354, a considerable increase over last year. The order is financially sound.

Insurance companies have to pay for fires in Nova Scotia this season \$343,000.

There are 323 inmates in the Halifax Poor's Asylum, made up of 186 men, 132 women and four children.

A new seam of coal has been discovered near Lingan, Cape Breton. A seam of coal 6 feet thick has been discovered at North Shore, Victoria county.

Over 7,000 barrels of apples were picked this year on five farms at Starr's Point, Cornwallis. Mr. Arthur Starr will pack over 2,000 barrels, nearly all of prime quality.

OTHER PROVINCES

There has been a recurrence of smallpox in Ottawa during the past few days; thirteen cases have developed in four days. Over fifty smallpox patients are in one hospital.

Some thirty cases of smallpox are in Quebec city and suburbs. Only a few however are serious. The health authorities urge public vaccination.

James Henry Lewis was indicted Thursday at Toronto for manslaughter Lewis is a Christian Scientist, and his child died from diphtheria. The Crown alleges the child's death was caused by lack of proper medical attention.

The small-pox contagion is spreading in Quebec. All schools are closed.

According to returns received by the C. P. R. nearly 9,000,000 bushels of wheat have been marketed in Manitoba, a very large increase over last year.

At Westmount, Montreal, a drunken Norwegian named Thorold Hansen murdered a little boy, Samuel Marotte for the few cents he was rattling in his pocket. The murderer gave himself up and confessed.

Mr. W. E. Massey of Toronto, the head of the Massey-Harris manufacturing firm, died last week of typhoid fever. He was in his prime, and a man of large influence for good.

UNITED STATES

The total strength of the United States army at the present time is 84,518.

One hundred and ten of the ring horses of Buffalo Bill's wild west show were crushed to death in a railway wreck near Lexington, Tuesday.

There was last week a serious riot in Louisiana between the whites and blacks. Three men killed and eleven wounded were reported. The scene of the trouble was Balltown, where a negro had been burned for assaulting a white woman. The troops had to be called out.

The apple famine which United States dealers have predicted for several months is now said to be an assured fact. Ever since the unfavorable apple weather in the spring buyers and growers have anticipated a short crop, and now local dealers announce that the situation is even worse than anticipated.

One dealer is quoted as estimating the crop at 23,000,000 barrels, as against 48,000,000 barrels last year and 70,000,000 the year previous.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

It is rumored at Constantinople that Madame Tsilka the companion of Miss Stone, and her child (born since her capture by the brigands) are dead. Wolves have been busy in Poland. In one district they have devoured 23 persons.

In Germany the financial and industrial crisis is severe. Great firms are failing; banks are staggering, and wages are becoming lower and lower.

A despatch from Antwerp says that a detachment of black troops recently sent by the Congo authorities to quell a revolt at Balugis, in Kassaï, was captured, and the soldiers were assassinated, roasted and eaten.

Earthquakes were felt throughout a wide area in Italy Wednesday.
