My associates and myself have a very earnest ambition to make the year 1901, the twentieth year of Christian Endeavor, the best year in all our history. We have formulated some new plans, which, believe, if carried out, will strengthen every strong society. revive every lagging society, and advance the cause of Christ through out the world. The plans relate to our honorary membership, our younger membership, to a Decision Day, and a Twentieth Birthday thank offering for missions. But we cannot c rry out these plans or make them effective without your co-operation. This wevery earnestly crave. Shall I tell you how we may work together for these ends?

First. Let us strengthen and unify our Local Unions. Does your society belong to a Local Union? If not, why not? If only two genuine Christian Endeavor societies are within easy access of each other, they may form a helpful Local Union. Occasional Local Union meetings will then help them to do better work in and for their own churches. Plans have been formalated that, if followed out, will se cure the success of any Local Union large or small. Uniform programmes are furnished by the United Society of Christian Endeavor. These have proved as helpful to those who have adopted them as the uniform prayer meeting topics to our individual societies. The Christian Endeavor World will give during the coming year frequent helps and suggestions for the Local Unions.

Second. Let us establish on a firm and rational basis every local society by having an Honorable Honorary Membership. This plan puts new emphasis and honor upon the honorary membership. It makes it possible for every active Christian however old or however busy, to remain always a Christian Endea vorer, while it provides that he shall not prevent the younger and more inexperienced from bearing their members, and this should be the only honorable door out of the active membership.
