At Digby Wednesday, Arch Connors colored was sentenced to seven years in the penitentiary for stealing flour from a freight car. This is his third offence. He had been in Dorchester before three years.

A Miss Powers, of Sydney is suing Mr. Alfred Stewart of Charlotte-town for breach of promise to marry. She demands \$2,000 for her betrayed affections.

It is announced that \$2,000,000 will be spent on improving the I. C. R. between Truro and Sydney. At Mulgrave at present the facilities are inadequate as only a car can be transferred at once. The government have ordered from the Armstrong, Whitworth Co., a steel screw of 2,000 horse power costing \$250,000 which will carry four cars each trip. The terminal facilities at Sydney are inadequate and will be increased. The work of erection of freight and other buildings will be commenced in the spring. Sixty locomotives and 1,200 freight cars will be delivered next month to the I. C. R.

Over \$250,000 were paid in wages by the Nova Scotia steel company to 714 men employed at Sydney Mines for the year 1900. A good deal of this was paid by the general mining association.

A special freight train telescoped another at Folly Lake one night last week. An engine was derailed and a car badly damaged.

The Nova Scotia Steel Company presented its employees at Sydney Mines with a passenger car to be utilized for their conveyance morning and evening from and to the colliery. The car has a capacity of two hundred.

News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK

Application will be made to the Legislature next session to incorporate The New Brunswick Central Coal and Railway Co., which proposes building a railway from Moncton to Fredericton, passing through Queens county coal field, connecting the C. P. R. and Canada Eastern near Fredericton with Moncton, and also having running powers over the Central and Canada Eastern Railway, with other powers.

The York Municipal Council on Tuesday elected Dr. O. E. Morehouse, of Bright, warden, John Black secretary-treasurer and J. W. McCreey auditor. A vote of \$200 was made to buy colors for the 71st regiment.

In Shediac, Tuesday, fire broke out in the annex of the two-story building belonging to R. C. Tait, used by him as a warehouse, public hall and cooperage shop. This building together with three or four adjacent bars and outbuildings belonging to E. J. Smith and others, was totally destroyed. Tait's warehouse contained about six thousand barrels of potatoes ready for shipment, and these were almost a total loss. The amount of insurance is \$3,000. The loss will be about nine thousand dollars.

A Grand Falls, correspondent says it is rumored that work on the new pulp mill will be resumed in the spring. The vast water power there, sooner or later will be utilized by capitalists.

Referring to the use of explosives in taking fish, the Estapor News says: "Two Grand Man fishermen write that in only one instance, which came under their notice, were fish obtained two days in succession on the same ground for the second day or any more fish were caught on the ground for the rest of the season, by explosives, and very few by hook and line, although quite early in the season. Besides driving the fish from the ground, they found a large proportion of fish wounded which were caught on hook and line, from one-tenth to one-half, and in one instance they threw away forty-one out of sixty-two caught."

The dry goods firm of Manchester, Robertson & Allison is to be incorporated into a company. The capital stock of the company is to be \$800,000, divided into 8,000 shares of \$100 each, and the chief place of business is to be in the city of St. John, with a branch house in London, England. The applicants are James F. Robertson, Joseph Allison, W. Hazen Brnaby, Walter C. Allison and T. E. G. Arnsong, the first three of whom are to be the provisional directors.

The St. John County municipal council passed a complimentary address, with the gift of an armchair, to James Ross, of St. Martins, who is believed to be the oldest man in the province. It is believed that he was born in Rosshire, Scotland 110 years ago, and has lived nearly eighty years at his present home.

The Charlotte County Council has dismissed Scott Act Inspector Maxwell and appointed Peter H. McCullum in his stead at a salary of twenty-five dollars per month.

Application will be made to Parliament of Nova Scotia next session for an act to be called the Nova Scotia Central Railway Company, with all necessary powers to construct a line of railway from a point in or near New Glasgow to some point at Chedabucto Bay or near the town of Guysboro.

The population of Sydney is set down at 12,500.

OTHER PROVINCES.

In Montreal Tuesday, night fire did \$10,000 damages to the premises of E. Corestine, wholesale furrier. Insured.

A valuable stock of thread was badly damaged by the falling in of the floors of the company's warehouse in Montreal on Sunday. The stock was valued at over \$100,000.

Mr. Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, has applied to the Newfoundland ministry to renew for the present year the modus vivendi respecting the French shore question in order to enable negotiations to be conducted with France during the coming summer for a settlement of the question. The cabinet is not willing to agree to this suggestion unless some definite proposals are made.

At Regina, N. W. T., Thursday, Morrison, the Moosomin murderer, paid the penalty of his crime. Morrison murdered five members of the McArthur family last June.

John Wiseraed John Marsh of Niagara N. Y., attempted to cross Niagara River above the falls Sunday. They lost control of their boat and were carried into the rapids. Wiseraed, who was unable to swim, was swept over the falls and drowned. Marsh, after a desperate struggle in the icy water, was rescued by persons along the shores. The men were almost half way across the river when the boat was caught in the field of ice. They fought desperately to extricate their boat, but without success. As they passed the power house both men got out of the boat onto the floating ice. The boat passed on through the rapids and over the falls. The two men floated down the river. Marsh was two hundred feet from the shore and Wiseraed was at least twenty feet further away. At Willow Island several men formed a line and with the aid of a long pole succeeded in getting near enough to Marsh to rescue him. Wiseraed clung to the ice until he was tossed off into the tumbling waters and drifted over the brink.

UNITED STATES.

The body of Meyer Wiesbad, a jewelry peddler was found in a truck at a New York pier on Wednesday. The man's throat had been cut and there were other marks of violence.

Norman McKinney, colored, has been lynched at Ocala, Fla., for wrecking the Plant system fast train near Dunnell on Sunday night.

Joseph Omsbee, eighteen years old lost his way in the woods near Concord, N. H. Saturday and was frozen to death. He body was found Sunday in a swamp.

James A. Mount who retired Monday from the office of governor of the state of Indiana, died very suddenly Wednesday night at Indianapolis. He had attended a receipt on given by Mrs. Mount during the afternoon. Heart disease was the cause of death.

The various gifts which have been made to Harvard University during the past year amounted \$532,519.

Small pox is said to be prevalent in the Minnesota lumber camps, and spreading at an alarming rate. The Grassy and Deer river camps are both under quarantine. The camps are along the eastern branch of the Eastern Minnesota railway and ten miles apart.

Alexander, a negro, who attempted to assault Miss Eva Roth and who was supposed to have assaulted and killed Pearl Forbes in this city in November last, was taken from the sheriff's guard by a mob and burned at the stake at the scene of his crimes, half a dozen blocks from the centre of the city. Probably 8,000 people witnessed the lynching.

Dr. George F. Shady said in an interview regarding the prevalence of the grip in New York. "The grip is just as bad as it can be in New York and pneumonia is worse than the grip. At a conservative estimate there are now 100,000 cases of grip in New York city. The duration of the disease is not very long, three or four days, but it will grow worse. Two weeks from now the type will be more virulent. It is doing its work now. It is leaving its victims awakened. The epidemic has a catarrhal tendency. It predisposes the patient to pneumonia and lung trouble."

The cost of governing the United States amounted last year to nearly \$488,000,000.

While trying to save his bank book and insurance policy in a burning building at Chicago Thursday, Frank Crowell, superintendent of Swift & Company's glue factory, lost his life. The bank book and insurance policy were found clasped in his hands.

Chas. Allen, a painter, was found frozen to death on the ice on Merrimack River Sunday morning. Allen was 24 years of age and unmarried. It is supposed that he wandered out upon the ice, became bewildered and sleepy and laid down and succumbed.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The Manchester Guardian asserts that all the Transvaal mines are being consolidated into a single company which will vie with the Standard Oil Company in being the richest trust in the world.

The correspondent of the Daily Mail, giving later details of the experiences of the railway passengers who were snow bound while on the way to Olessea, says: "All the trains have now arrived here. The drifts have hardened to the consistency of ice and in one case a tunnel had to be cut through a drift four hundred yards long and thirty-eight feet deep. Many passengers who had attempted to walk here were found by sleighing parties frozen to death."

Australia is to introduce penny postage April 1. New Zealand made the change Jan 1.

The mail from Demerara brings a report of large fields of diamonds in the interior of British Guiana. A company has been formed in England to work the claims.

British shipping still exceeds the shipping of all other countries combined. In British shipyards last year there were a million and a half tons of ships built—nearly all steamers. 50 steamers have been built that exceed 8000 tons. 5 steamers have been built of 12,200 tons. Sailing vessels are rapidly disappearing.

The annual expenditure for Bibles in the United States is about \$2,000,000. Small as this sum is compared with the amount spent for tobacco or rum, it must be remembered that Bibles bought in one year usually last for several years and that this amount is far in excess of that spent for any other book the world around. Moreover, it is annually increasing. Other books have a spasmodic popularity and sink soon into obscurity, but the Bible continues to grow in power and in the interest and regard of men.

GOLD HOARDED BY MISERS.

MILLIONS DISAPPEAR ANNUALLY FROM CIRCULATION. The world is full of millions and millions of long-lost sovereigns. A competent authority has just completed some investigations which, he declares, show that in three years the Bank of England has lost trace of no fewer than twenty million golden coins of the realm. This wholesale disappearance of the elusive sovereign has been going on for years.

A river of gold has flowed unceasingly from Threadneedle street to all parts of the world, but it has come back only as a tiny yellow streamlet. What has become of the surplus in its wantonness? "Misers" is the unpoetical explanation for a great part of this disappearance. There still exist in this and other countries people who are unbusiness-like enough to hoard to gold and keep it lying idle by them for the pleasure of knowing it is there and occasionally counting it.

The people of India appear to be particularly addicted to a habit that is more reminiscent of medieval times than of an age when money is generally saved so that more can be made with it. In the kingdom of Bombay it is estimated that twelve million golden sovereigns are hoarded. It has the record of Bombay alone, what is the total for the whole country? China, too, absorbs a vast amount of gold that never sees the light again. As a matter of fact, while the whole world is searching for a good way to acquire gold, a goodly part of it appears to be engaged in the least thrilling pursuit of hiding it away.

Great Britain is not gulsted of this commercial sin. Do not all of the kingdom are greivously of gold, which if discovered and opened, might restore to circulation a vast amount of wealth at present absolutely useless. At a spot about two miles from Herefordshire Beacon a treasure chest is recorded in the local history as having been buried by a great family once resident in the district. But the money cannot be found. There is a similar record in connection with Hulme castle formerly a seat of the Parnswich family. Somewhere near Sokesey castle, Shropshire, there is

believed to be hidden a great chest filled with gold coins, but up to the present all efforts to find it ended in failure.—London Mail.

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GENERAL RELIGIOUS NOTES.

—The Baptists of Great Britain have had a net gain of 12,420 in ship, bringing up the total membership to 365,678.

—The emancipation of the colored people is likely to be the fruit of the evangelization, and hence the government discourages Christian missionary efforts among these two millions of Mohammedans. The unanswered charge made at a missionary conference in Java. The Dutch have been a century and a half in possession of this colony, and the latest news know of gives 26 missionaries, 40,000 pupils in schools, and 40,000 cases of medical last year. Many a B. H. sharply criticizes the government's oppression, or rather suppression of the Javaneses; and what we have made reveals a vast reform.

—The old Armenian Bible, republished in the Armenian language by the American Bible Society, is nearly exhausted. While it had been published times, the price has been prohibitive. —Rev. Charles G. Ames, Church of the Disciples, says that of four to five hundred million of professed Christians in the world, there are from nine to ten million of heathen people. The heathen nation is trying to get self the possessions of Christians. There is not one of the Christian nations that is not in taking by force the beliefs of pagan peoples. Kossuth, two centuries ago, that there is a really Christian nation. If it were not true in 1850 it is not true now. Among so-called Christian principles, policies, and practices largely dominant that represent more than the angel.
