DEATHS.

CURRIE.—In St. Joseph's Hospital, Port Arthur, Ont., of typhoid fever, on the first of Oct., Charles Gordon Currie, aged sixteen years, youngest son of Mr. Richard and Adelia Currie, of Bath, Car. Co. About two months ago he went west on one of the harvest excursions, and entered into the employ of a gentleman near Indian Head, where he remained over a month. Feeling somewhat ill for several days, he decided to return home. On the 18th of Sept. he started from Indian Head, but gradually grew worse until he reached Port Arthur—some seven hundred miles, and there he was taken to the hospital, where he remained until his death, Oct. 1st. The body was embalmed, according to directions from home, and forwarded to Bath, arriving there on the 10th inst. The remains were met at the train by a large concourse of people, which followed them sadly to the Bath Free Baptist church, where a memorial service was conducted by Rev. M. L. Gregg. Many relatives, occupied the mourning seats, particularly noticeable among them being the venerable grandfather, of the deceased, Rev. Joseph Noble. After the service which was made particularly touching by the singing of such selections as "Near My Bed to Thee," "Go Bury Thy Sorrow" and "Gathering Home," the funeral line was again formed, which followed the remains to their last resting place in the family burying-ground at Bath. Beside father and mother, two sisters and two brothers mourn the loss of one they tenderly loved.

Whereas during our denominational existence of nearly 70 years God has blessed us and built us up as a people while preaching doctrines based on free grace, free agency, free salvation and free or open communion as taught by the founders and fathers of the Free Baptists of this country.
Therefore resolved that we believe in the Scriptural truthfulness of these doctrines, and that we will urge home to the hearts of our people these truths with unabated earnestness.
The following was presented and adopted:
The Conference has, with pleasure, welcomed the representative of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, the Rev. J. H. McDonald, and heartily reciprocates the fraternal feelings expressed by him.
2. We rejoice in the success which is attending the work of our Baptist brethren in all its branches, and we fervently pray that much greater success may attend them.
3. We appreciate the good feelings of our brethren of the Baptist Convention in their invitation to us to cooperate with them in education and foreign missions.
4. Having considered the proposal, we have been led to the decision that, as we are now situated cooperation in the way proposed is not feasible, and that it is wiser for us to continue to do our part in these departments of christian service as at present.
Revs Dr Hartley, Dr McLeod, C T Phillips, B H Nobles and J W Clarke were elected members of the Conference Executive.
At 10 p. m. the business of the session having been completed, the Conference adjourned.
