I was leaving the door for Sunday school when I saw at the gate a crowd gathered around something or someone. (I could distinguish little more than pile of rags) on a small cot swung from a bamboo pole borne on the shoulders

of two jungle Santals. They put down the cot in the shade of the mangoe tree, and I found upon it a well built healthy Santal woman of middle age terribly lacerated by a bear. She was the mother of six children. She had left her family at home and gone to the jungle to gather sticks to cook their food. Her husband was one of the bearers. His wardrobe consisted of a strip of homespun cloth about his loins and a thorn from the jungle which in a measure restrained the picturesque tangle of black curls on his crown. 1 did what I could for her, cleansing and caring for her wounds and relieving her pain by an anodyne, then sent her where she would have the regular hospital treatment. I was not able to give, sending occasional assistance to the family deprived of the mother's earnings. Her perfect health was the doctor's best ally. Within a month she was out of the hospital and the mother of another child.
