The rapid expansion of the Australian shipping trade continues undiminished. In South Wales it was larger in 1900 than in any previous year. The total number of vessels entered and cleared was 7,082, against 6,400 in 1899. Of these 6,308 were under the British flag and 724 under those of other countries.

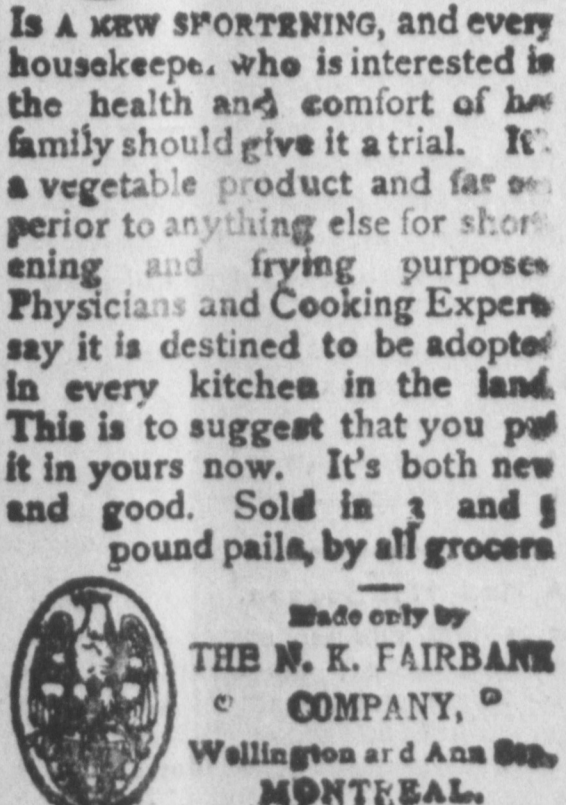
