

News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

The work of making the survey for the proposed railway from Chipman to Gibson is being prosecuted E. G. Evans is in charge of the survey.

An immigrant building in Canada is to be erected at Sand point, St. John Work on the foundation has been begun.

During the month of September 10,000 tons of hay will be sent from St. John N. B. to South Africa.

The New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company has decided to call for the construction of a railway from Chipman to Newcastle.

The cranberry crop, usually a splendid one, is reported this year a failure along the Bay of Fundy coast.

The town council of Campbellton have placed a license fee of \$500 on non-residents coming to town to carry on business.

Salt wells have been discovered at Meers farm at Bay Side, Ch. Co. and the prevalence of the rock in large quantities is almost assured.

The value of goods imported and entered for consumption during the month of July, 1901, at Fredericton was \$19,102 duty \$1,714.06 and for the corresponding month last year \$50,102, duty \$1,641.51.

The fellow workmen of Coleman Shields, the night foreman at the Aberdeen Mill, who a few days ago lost his hand have made up a purse of \$115 for him.

NOVASCOTIA.

A valuable find of gold is reported to have been made at Waterville, Kings Co.

W. C. Archibald, fruit grower of Wolfville, reports that the drought has damaged the fruit crop in Kings Co. and through Annapolis Valley.

One hundred coke ovens are being heated and will be in operation within two weeks. The gasometer at the Sydney Steel Works is completed and will be in operation in a short time.

There has been an extraordinary catch of mackerel along the N. S. shores east and west. One fisherman is mentioned who captured 72,000 fish.

Ernest Peters, a Westport fisherman, was fortunate enough the other day to pick up about twenty pounds of ambergris near Brier Island.

One of the spans of the Shubenacadie Railway Bridge was successfully floated last week into its place on the piers.

An arrangement has been entered into with Mackenzie and Mann to build the Railway from Halifax along the Western Shore. It is to be the "Halifax and South Western" Railway.

The Monastery property at Big Tracadie, Antigonish has been purchased by the Superior of the Abbey of Our Lady of Thymadeuc, France.

At Halifax Thursday a meeting of mayors and representatives of boards of trade was held to protest against the increase of fire insurance rates.

Some 3,000 acres of land near Cheverie have been leased by New York parties and a company is about to apply for incorporation to explore for oil in that section.

At Sydney Monday an employe of the Steel Company named Rastum slipped and one of his feet got into the furnace. The flesh was burned off to the bone.

At Shubenacadie Wednesday burglars broke into the store of Jas. Gass & Son. They blew open the safe, getting \$10, two gold open-face watches, a quantity of silverware and other goods.

Shubenacadie was visited Wednesday night by a terrific electrical storm. The barn of J. M. Wallace was struck by lightning and two valuable horses killed.

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At Niagara Falls, Ont., H. C. Sheffield, until recently sleeping car distributor for the Canadian Pacific railway in Ontario, committed suicide by shooting himself through the head.

The Marconi system of wireless telegraphy will be installed along the Labrador coast at an early date.

UNITED STATES.

Nineteen States and Territories are reported to have suffered severely from the drought of the last two weeks.

A town of 10,000 people known as Lawton has grown up just in the newly opened Indian territory almost within a night.

Nineteen per cent. of the horses in Chicago are now suffering from influenza. The disease is proving fatal in from three to five cases out of every hundred.

During a storm at Minersville, Pa., on Wednesday morning the wind lifted a big newly erected dwelling from its foundations and hurled it against a house near by, which was also removed from its foundations.
