## News of the Week.

### NEW BRUNSWICK

The first fatality from the handling of dynamite in fishing occurred on the afternoon of 17th instant at Grand Manan, when a young man a Frenchman, named Leblanc, was killed by the explosion of half a stick of dynamite which he held in his hand with the fuse lighted waiting to throw it among the fish.

News from the lumber drives of the upper St. John, the Gleaner says, is somewhat discouraging. John Kilburn and Robert Aiken both are hung up with large drives and with little prospect of getting out.

Large quantities of white fish have been distributed this spring from the Rapid de Femme hatchery near Grand Falls.

A fire at Porter Road, on the St. Martins Railway destroyed 300,000 feet of lumber and principally hardwood. The loss will be about \$3,000 insured.

A. L. Stickney's house and barn and the school house at Stickney's Brook C. Co., were totally destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon.

Forest fires are burning along the North Shore. The chief damage reported so far is in the vicinity of Rogersville and Barnaby River. Near the latter place the house and barn of Mr. David Buckley were destroyed. People in the vicinity have packed their belongings to move at a moment's notice. A quantity of railway ties and posts were burned. Fires are along the Kent Northern.

Nearly four years ago Mr. W. C. Anslow, editor of the Newcastle Advocate went gunning about 25 miles from home, and did not return. Search was made but no trace of him was found. It was believed that either by accident or exhaustion he had perished in the woods. Last Friday his remains were found eight miles from where he was last seen and within half a mile of a house. A stream driver named Hubbard made the ghastly find and notified the people of his discovery. A gun, a belt buckle, a watch and a pocket knife were found with the remains and by these articles identification was made certain. The gun was lying beside the skeleton. Where the unfortunate man was overcome by exhaustion he was within 100 yards of little southwest Miramichi.

### NOVA SCOTIA.

There is an epidemic of measles at Springhill. Men women and children have been smitten. Seventeen deaths were reported in one week.

The Yarmouth Street Railway Co. has decided to extend its line from Milton north to the pumping station. Other extensions, including the western part of the town, are under consideration.

A satisfactory settlement of the difference among the faculty of the Halifax Medical College has been reached. The resignations of Drs. McKay, Chisholm and Goodwin have been withdrawn.

A cablegram from Montevideo says the ship Savona put in with her captain and three of the crew dead. They were killed by an immense wave which broke over the ship. Captain Hedley McDougall was a native of Maitland, aged 42 years.

Mrs. Arsenau of Joggins Mines, has attained her 106th birthday.

There appears to be a band of house breakers doing rounds in Digby county as several houses have been entered in the neighborhood.

Wm. C. Campbell, aged 86, with a horse aged 25, were enjoying themselves harrowing in grain at Stanley near Windsor last week.

Capt. A. J. Skillen, of the Schr. Mand, from St. Martins, Cumb. Co., was knocked overboard by the boom and drowned last week, near Ise en Hante.

Mess Sergeant Gambell, Royal Canadian Regiment, decamped with about \$500 of the regiment's money.

A young man, Peter Melanson, was killed in a saw mill on the Sissiboo river a day or two ago. A large knot of wood thrown by a buzz saw struck him in the head throwing him almost twenty feet.

It is stated that the D. A. R. Co., has offered the Yarmouth Steamship Company \$250,000, and the company decided to sell yesterday for \$265,000.

The Sissiboo (Digby) pulp mills give employment to 400 hands and produce about 300 tons of pulp per month. Alas for the trees!

The government steamer Minto, which arrived at Halifax Friday, brought news of the drowning of a father and son from a schooner bound from Gloucester to the Banks. The drowned boy, Leslie McKay, was stowing the flying jib when he fell overboard. His father George McKay, leaped to his son's assistance and both were drowned. They belonged to Shelburne. The boy was seventeen years of age, the father about forty.

Nova Scotia boards of trade are vigorously protesting against the 25 per cent. increase in fire insurance rates in that province, promoted by Upper Canadian managers.

The sch. Edmund Roy, Captain Gilbert, arrived at Halifax Sunday with 1,575 fur seals. This is the first cargo of such seals ever brought to Halifax. The schooner left eight months ago with a crew of 14 men, and the cargo she brings back is estimated to be worth \$25,000.

### OTHER PROVINCES

Fire destroyed the Lake of the Woods Milling Company's elevator on Saturday; 25,000 bushels of wheat were also lost. Building and contents insured.

The Kingston Ont., Locomotive Works are to be removed to Quebec.

The premises and mill of the Toronto Medical Company, of Toronto Junction, have been seized, and W. P. Hope and Sydney Flynn, proprietors, arrested on a charge of using the mails for fraudulent purposes. Six thousand letters were found on the premises containing guesses in word competition for prize distribution of \$200 to purchasers of medicine advertised. The business has been enormous.

Government Commissioner Castle declares that from the present appearances the crop in Manitoba will have forty million bushels of wheat for export this fall.

### UNITED STATES

The body of R. A. Bridges, the Bangor traveller who disappeared from Fort Kent Maine on May 11, was found on Saturday in the St. John river a few miles below Edmunston.

About 50,000 machinists throughout the United States struck last week for a nine hour day and more wages. No machinists engaged in government work are effected.

At Albany, N. Y., Sunday electric cars racing for a switch, while running in opposite directions at the rate of 40 miles an hour, cost five lives by a terrific collision, while over 40 people were injured some fatally and others seriously.

Herbert E. Blood, a farm hand, went to the home of Mr. George F. Nickerson, at Bridgewater, Mass., and shot Miss Fawn Drvis and Mrs. Nickerson and then tried to kill himself.

A heavy wind storm has been sweeping over Nevada. Utah, Southern Idaho and Wyoming for the past thirty hours at a velocity at times exceeding fifty miles an hour. The storm has resulted in the complete prostration of telegraph and telephone wires in all directions.

### BRITISH AND FOREIGN

The village of Lurenza has been partially destroyed by an avalanche. The number of fatalities is not yet known but already 15 corpses have been recovered.

Bresci, the assassin of the late King Humbert, has committed suicide at the penitentiary of Santo Stefano, Italy. Bresci recently had been suffering from extreme excitement, declared to be from remorse. Tuesday night he made a rope from his blankets and strangled himself.

Emperor William has issued stringent orders to henceforth exclude newspaper reporters from all and semi-public functions where the Emperor intends to speak. The police have been given instructions to render impossible the stenographic reporting of his speeches or the taking of notes thereon.
