News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

In the Miryville assault case Police Magistrate Marsh found Alfred Barker guilty on the three charges laid against him of assault by Harry Blair, and imposed fines totalling \$30 and costs.

John W. Dickie has been appointed registrar of deeds for Queens Co., in the room of Robert T. Babbitt deceased.

The chairman and the board of investigating governors of the Royal Canadian Humane Association have unanimously awarded medals to Lloyd Cheney, Arthur Cheney and Francis B. Cheney, for conspicuous bravery in saving three men from the wrecked schooner Velma, from Murr Ledges, N. B., October 18, 1900.

David H. Nise has been appointed Post-Master at Indiantown, St. John, in place of the late W. G. Brown.

The chairman of the water and light department says in Moncton's annual report that extensive defalcations have been discovered, dating back to 1895 and amounting to over \$12,000, of which \$10,000 has been paid in to the city by the late accountant. The overdraft at the Bank of Montreal at the beginning of the year was found to be \$14,757.26, instead of \$9,757.26, as given last year, and has been reduced during the year \$12,085. The special auditor found that the amount due by consumers last year was \$3,110.25 instead of \$15,710.43, as given in last year's report.

Digby people not wishing to be behind their neighbors, are agitating for a steel shipbuilding plant. It is thought that iron and steel ships can be built cheaper than in Halifax.

At Digby Thursday Portia Weir, and Morris Raymond, while coasting down the hill, collided with a telegraph pole, the former breaking his left leg above the knee, while his younger brother escaped the pole by going over the embankment on to the flats. Raymond came out with his head badly cut in several places.

OTHER PROVINCES.

Herbert J. Hallett, Helen Knight and her sister, Amelia Knight, young people, were driving across the railway track in a covered carriage near Bowmanville, Ont., Sunday, when a fast train crashed into the carriage, instantly killing the occupants.

The frozen herring fishery in Placentia Bay, Newfoundland, will be a total failure. The prospects of loading the American fishing fleet have been destroyed by the soft weather and by a succession of rain storms.

The new Toronto directory contains 86,501 individual names, from which the present population is estimated to be 237,977.

At Peterboro, Ont., Sunday the Stanley piano works were burned. Loss \$18,000; partially insured.

Elle Jobin's shoe factory Quebec was gutted by fire Sunday morning. The insurance on the contents amounts to \$38,000.

A recent outbreak of typhoid fever amongst the Fox Bay people who were sent to Manitoba carried off eight or ten of the little group.

On the 20th ult. a fire at Souris P. E. Island destroyed \$12,000 worth of property.

Daniel Todd was arrested in Winnipeg last week, charged with the murder of John Gordon on the 17th October last.

The Manitoba government has purchased the lines of the Northern Pacific Railway in the province. The details are secret.

The Hull, Que., post office was broken into Sunday night and all letters which were suspected to contain money were stolen.

John B. Lufsamme, charged with creating a disturbance in Montreal's music hall by using insulting language to the person of His Majesty King Edward, was fined \$10 and costs Wednesday.

As the I. C. R. express was approaching the bridge across the Yamaska river, P. Q., on Friday night, the brakeman shouted 'St. Hyacinthe.' Napoleon Sicaud, a passenger, who had been dozing, hastily rushed out with his sachel, evidently thinking that the train was leaving St. Hyacinthe station, and fell over the guard of the bridge, a distance of about thirty feet. His body was recovered shortly afterwards on the ice, the skull being crushed and badly mangled.

UNITED STATES.

Smallpox is again spreading in New York. It is particularly severe in the district known as 'Little Italy,' from 112 1/2 street to 116 1/2 street, and from Fifth avenue to the East river.

The Berkshire hotel at Great Breunington, Mass., was burned last week causing a loss of \$50,000.

At Bessemer, Mich., a lamp exploded in the residence of Louis Beisel, and in the fire which followed two children were burned to death.

Robert Calvert and his wife, weavers aged respectively 64 and 61 years, were asphyxiated in a Fall River, Mass., tenement on Monday.

The body of Geo. W. Sanford, postmaster at Bridgewater, Me. was found in his room at the Exchange Hotel Friday night. Apparently he shot himself through the temple with a revolver.

In a row in the Latin quarter in the North End, Boston, Wednesday, one man was killed and three others were wounded; two of them seriously. One of the injured men Raphael Falia, is under arrest charged with murder.

Fire Wednesday destroyed nearly all the business houses of Tolono, Ill., entailing losses estimated at \$100,000; partially insured.

At Peterson, N. J., Walter C. McAlister, William A. Dath and Andrew J. Campbell, who were found guilty of murder in the second degree for the killing of Jennie Bosschieter on October 18, 1900, by the administration of chloral and by subsequent rape, were sentenced to 30 years each in State Prison. George J. Kerr, who was concerned in the first part of the crime was given 15 years.

In New York Thursday there was an explosion in the cigar factory of the W. Wickes Co., in East 31st street by which over 20 persons were injured. It was followed the same night by one of the fiercest conflagrations New York has witnessed in many years, causing an estimated loss of \$1,500,000. The burned area took in about one city block.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The books of the registrar of deeds at Pretoria show that ex-President Kruger, after the relief of Ladysmith, transferred his property to his heirs, none of whom are now fighting, they all having either surrendered or been taken prisoners.

In Brussels, Tuesday, there was a disastrous fire at the institute of St. Joseph at La Louviere, a religious seminary with 600 scholars. The injured include a priest and fireman. The loss is heavy.

A general strike of the employes of the Paris underground railway has been declared. The stations are occupied by troops. There is a general congestion of passenger traffic, especially among shoppers and people traveling to and from business.

Tremendous snow storms have prevailed in Russia. Tempestuous weather has visited Europe generally.
