Kings—Titus Hicks and Nathan Ryder to be Justices of the Peace.

Application has been made for the incorporation of a company which proposes to build and run between Fredericton and Woodstock a steamer so constructed as to be capable of getting over the shallowest points of the river channel during the entire summer season. The construction of the steamer will be commenced at once, and it is intended to have her ready for operation in July.

The lumber cut between Oak Point and Grand Bay this year will be near 5,000,000 feet.

Chatham has decided to purchase the plant of the Electric Light Co. and do its own lighting.

While shingling the roof of the round-house in the I. C. R. yard St. John, Friday, Jas. Scribner and J. F. Quinn, fell from a staging about 14 feet from the ground. Scribner sustained a fracture of the ankle; Quinn escaped with the loss of three teeth.

At St. Andrews, Saturday, Capt. Jas. Starkey committed suicide by drowning. He had been despondent for some time.

Dr. Manzer's house, Woodstock, was burned Saturday. Insured for \$1400.

Thursday evening, at Petitcodiac, Fred Beck, standing at the time on Burnham's store platform, was struck back of the ear by a slug shot from an air-gun.

The Moncton City Council was waited on Friday by a deputation representing the Evangelical Alliance and temperance societies, who asked that the funds from Scott Act fines be applied to the enforcement of the act, and for the dismissal of officers neglecting their duty. Mayor Atkinson promised consideration.

A horse belonging to Dr. Patterson, of Westfield, was lost through the ice near Grand Bay a few days ago.

In Ganong Bros.' candy factory, St. Stephen, Wednesday afternoon, Howard Dinsmore was descending from the third floor on the big freight elevator, when some of the gear broke and the elevator went with a crash some twenty-five or forty feet to the basement. Dinsmore was unconscious for four hours after the accident.

Chief Census Commissioner Hadow was in conference with the county commissioners of this city, last week, instructing them as to procedure in taking the census.

Mr. J. K. Fleming, M. P. P., Friday, entertained the students from Carleton county who are attending the University, Normal School and Business College. A most enjoyable evening was spent.

Premier Murray says, the government has decided to take vigorous action in regard to the completion of the Halifax & Yarmouth Railway.

The authorities are dealing with the Indian Road homicide. The Lantz boys have been arrested.—The Guysboro tragedy is being investigated.

Annie Gertrude Wallace, aged 21, of Lawrence town, has had Joshua P. Atwood, of Gloucester, Mass, aged 70, arrested on a charge of polygamy. She asserts that last July at Lawrence town she went through a marriage ceremony with Atwood. After they arrived in Gloucester the girl found that Atwood had been married twice before, and that wife No 2 was still alive, but had not been living with her husband for fifteen years.

The Pictou school-commissioners contemplate introducing manual training in the schools of that town.

Truro rate-payers have decided to build a brick and stone academy this summer to cost \$30,000. The rate-payers further approved of acquiring 1,000 acres of land to enlarge Victoria Park, to cost \$3,000.

At Lunenburg vessel building is being pushed with energy, and there are some ten or twelve approaching completion.

The town of Dartmouth has voted a \$100,000 subsidy to any ship building company to locate works on that side of the harbor.

Yarmouth, S. S. Co. contemplate putting on a steamer to run between Boston and Digby, or Annapolis, this summer. The City of Ghent has been chartered to take the place of the Bridgewater on the south shore after next trip.

Early Friday morning fire destroyed the Acacia Valley House, owned by Capt. Raymond, situated three miles from Digby. The inmates escaped in their night clothes. All the contents of the house were consumed. The Acacia Valley House had accommodations for seventy-five guests and was valued at ten thousand dollars. The insurance is small.

OTHER PROVINCES

At Dunnville, Ont., Wednesday, Alex Lynch, farmer beat his wife with an iron bolt till he thought she was dead, and then cut his own throat. The woman will recover.

Fire occurred on Tuesday at Ellerslie, P. E. I., A. E. McCall's store and warehouse, Orange Hall and a tailoring store being destroyed.

The McGill University, Montreal, has rescinded the rule prohibiting women from competing for scholarships and exhibitions.

Rev. R. W. Bell, a Methodist minister has been lost in the woods in Newfoundland.

The Canadian General Electric Light Company has bought thirty acres of land in Toronto and will at once erect the largest foundry in Canada. The new factory will be devoted exclusively to the manufacture of castings, engineering and electric cranes, of fifty tons lifting power.

The Ontario government's bill to grant lands in New Ontario to residents of the province who served in the South African war or on the frontier in '66, has been amended to provide that the men shall have the minerals and all the timber except pine on their lots.

The steamer Newfoundland arrived at St. John's Friday with a load of 20,000 seals worth \$30,000. The Newfoundland is the first steamer to reach St. John's from the ice this season. She was just 10 days from the time the season opened in getting her load. Seals are reported more plentiful this year than for a number of years.

UNITED STATES

Houlton's oldest hotel, "Sebastopol," and later known as Sleeper's Hotel, was burned Wednesday, together with a large stable and outbuildings. The loss is \$3,000, with no insurance.

The United States Secretary of Agriculture estimates that over \$6,000,000 worth of young livestock throughout the country was saved during 1900 by the prompt use of medicine for blackleg, sent out by the department. Information received shows that over 2,500,000 doses of the vaccine were distributed by the department during the year.

A new counterfeit American bank note has been put into circulation. It is a reproduction of the new five dollar issue of the series of 1899.

The fire loss in Boston for the insurance underwriters year ending March 1, was \$1,674,776, on buildings and contents, on which the insurance loss was \$1,407,584. The loss per cent of population was \$2.92.
