### NEW BRUNSWICK

Herbert Myers, a young son of James Myers, of Westfield Beach, was badly scalded Tuesday by pulling a kettle of boiling water over on him.

At Dalhousie Tuesday evening lightning struck the spire of St. John's Presbyterian church, and within an hour the fine building was burned.

A resident of Fox Creek Tuesday took his horse from the pasture to save it from lightning. The horse got loose in the barn, ate a quantity of paris green and was found dead next morning.

Houses belonging to Fred Wilson, Miles Wilson, C. McManus and Sey mour White were struck by lightning and more or less damaged Friday.

R. M. Pinder of the Bank of Montreal staff of this city suffered a stroke of paralysis induced by the heat on Tuesday. His condition is precarious.



### NOVA SCOTIA

The large bridge being built over the Shubenacadie river has cost the lives of six men who worked on the construction.

Ezra Stevens, of Forest Glen, Colchester, dropped dead while talking in his father's yard, Wednesday.

The sale of the timber land owned by the Nova Scotia Lumber Company has been definitely closed. The property consists of 65,000 acres or more of spruce and other timber lands in Halifax, Guysborough and Pictou counties, a mill that cost \$22,000, and a steel tug costing \$4,000. The price paid is understood to be in the vicinity of \$200,000.

The most difficult bridge to build in the maritime provinces is now in course of erection over the Shubenacadie River on the Midland railway. The work is made difficult by the fiercely rushing tides. The piers are now all in and two spans of the superstructure are on. Two more spans are built on shore, each weighing 170 tons. It is purposed to float these at high tide, one at a time on scows into place and settle them on to piers as the tide ebbs away. The strong tide gives but 40 minutes, just on the turn, to take the span from the shore and place it in position.




