**NEW BRUNSWICK.**

The residence of Louis Poirier, six miles above St. Louis village, Kent county, was totally destroyed by fire, with all its contents, Monday night. No insurance.

The Maritime Pure Food Company, of Woodstock, has gone out of business. The Company management is said to have been somewhat extravagant and there have been some losses through bad sales in England. The plant is valued at \$14,000, and there is about that much stock on hand manufactured and unmanufactured.

The Royal Gazette announces the appointment of Charles Appleby as a notary public—also the appointment of Henry Franklin of Grand Manan as a Justice of the Peace for Charlotte county.

In some of the back woods lumber camps the Globe says, the long winter and deep snow are causing serious trouble. Food supplies have run short and there has been an unusual shortage in fodder for the horses. More than one case has occurred where the snow was too deep for teams to get in or out and the horses have had to be shot in preference to being allowed to starve to death.

Dr. Crockett was elected Mayor of this city, defeating Mr. W. Smith by a large majority. There was a contest in only one ward, Dr. G. J. McNally and Mr. Farrell being elected.

The citizens ticket in Moncton was elected—Mr. H. Atkinson as Mayor.

Thursday evening the residence of Dr. Robert Ruddick, St. Martins, was destroyed by a fire.

At Shediac Thursday in a runaway Mr. and Mrs. James Webster were injured. Mr. Webster's sleigh was demolished. He was knocked senseless and Mrs. Webster was dragged about 100 yards. Each was badly bruised about the body and cut about the head.

At Chatham, Friday, Sproul's laundry was totally destroyed by fire and the Canada House badly damaged.

**NOVA SCOTIA.**

Frederick Congdon, barrister, Halifax, has been appointed to the position of legal advisor to the council of the Yukon Territory. He will have a salary of \$5,000 per year.

The body of the young man Bent, son of Capt. Bent, of Granville Ferry, who returned home from the States the day before Christmas, and suddenly disappeared during the night, and of whom no trace had since been discovered, was found on the cove near Clementsport Tuesday.

David Emack, one of the victims of the shooting affray near Shubenacadie died from his wounds the day after the shooting. Emack's companion, Ettinger, and the Junior Lantz, both wounded, are out of danger.

The town of Digby is considering the advisability of purchasing the plant and franchise of the Digby Electric Light Co. and Bear River Light, Heat and Power company, and doing its own lighting, and that of Bear River and intervening ten miles of country. The cost of the proposed scheme would be about \$40,000.

A case of smallpox is reported at Church Point, Digby county. It is thought the germs were carried in clothing of a man lately returned from New York.

Edward O'Connor was found on the side of the road a short distance from Guysboro, with his skull badly fractured as a result of which he died Monday afternoon.

In Parrsboro the scarlet fever epidemic is extending rapidly. Twenty houses are quarantined. Two departments of the school have been closed.

The arbitrators on Nova Scotia's claim for refund of subsidy paid to the Eastern Extension Railway have awarded the province the sum of \$671,000, the full amount claimed, without interest.

General Manager Gifkins has ordered that D. A. R. trains shall not stop at stations between Weymouth and Meteghan on account of the smallpox scare.

The inquest at Guysboro on the death of Edward O'Connor resulted in the following verdict: "We believe the deceased, Edward O'Connor, came to his death by a violent blow inflicted with a weapon in the hands of some person or persons unknown to us, said blow being on his head; and we further believe that he received the injury which caused his death while in the company of Henry Keay and Thomas Carey, jr., both of Ragged Head, in the county of Guysboro, on the afternoon of Monday, March 11.

In the Shubenacadie shooting, resulting in the death of Emack, the Coroner's jury gave a verdict that the shooting by the Lantz brothers was in self-defence.

At the Amherst Boot and Shoe Company's works Saturday David McKel, aged 14, was looking over the elevator shaft when the elevator descended, striking him on the head, he was forced down between the elevator and the shaft, crushing his head.

**OTHER PROVINCES.**

The Woodstock Ont., Baptist College has been closed on account of a scarlet fever epidemic.

Early seeding is reported in the west. The North-West Irrigation Company receiving a telegram from Stirling, Alberta, stating that Mr. Bomerill sowed ten acres of wheat on Feb. 28 on land prepared in the Fall.

A young son of Mr. Gaynon whose mill was destroyed at Baie Ste. Paul Quebec, Tuesday evening perished in the flames.

Friday night at Caplin, P. Q., an oil lamp in the residence of Postmaster Gauthier exploded and set fire to the building, which was destroyed. Mrs. Gauthier and four children were burnt to death. Mr. Gauthier broke his leg in jumping from a window.

The C. P. R. are advised by Lord Strathcona that the Imperial Government is sending an officer to the Dominion to purchase horses in the North-West to be sent to South Africa. One or two thousand will be purchased and shipped at Halifax. The horses used by the Strathconas were so serviceable that the War Office authorities want more of the same breed, and Canada will be looked to to supply the right material for the service.

Montreal had another big and fatal fire Saturday morning; the loss being a quarter of a million dollars. The wholesale druggist supply house of Leeming, Miles & Co., One fireman was killed.

**UNITED STATES**

Three lives were sacrificed, nearly a dozen men were more or less injured and many thousands of dollars damage was the result of a fire that started in the press room of the Boston Daily Advertiser and Record, Friday evening.

Fire destroyed Cloverport, Ky. Thursday. Loss \$500,000.

In Chicago, thirteen-year-old Frederick Windbiel, the son of a saloon keeper, has been arrested charged with robbing his father of over \$4,000. The boy's aunt is also under arrest and she has confessed that she and her husband induced the boy to take the money from his father. Sproule fled to Germany.

In Washington, Penn., during the absence of the parents, the residence of Guy Williams was destroyed and their three children, aged one, three and five years, were burned to death.

By the explosion of the boiler in the Boremus laundry, Chicago, Monday eight people were instantly killed 29 were injured and several are missing.

A starch factory, at Kankakee, Ill., was burned Monday, involving a loss of \$325,000.

During the progress of a fire in Pittsburg, Pa., Friday, one man lost his life, and three others were badly hurt. The property loss will be \$250,000.

**BRITISH AND FOREIGN**

The British naval estimates for 1901-02 amount to £30,875,500, an increase of over £2,000,000 chiefly for shipbuilding. There is an increase of 3,745 in the number of officers and men. The new shipbuilding programme provides for three battleships six armored cruisers, ten torpedo boats, two sloops of war and five submarine boats. On some of these vessels work was begun in 1900. All the ships will be in course of construction this year.

Friction has arisen at Tien Tsin between the British and the Russians over a piece of land alleged to belong to the railway company and to have been in their possession for several years. According to despatches from Tien Tsin the Russians assert that this land is part of their new concessions, and therefore Russian property. The manager of the railway had begun to make a siding but was stopped by the Russian authorities. He appealed to Col. McDonald, who referred the matter to General Barrow British chief of staff in Pekin, who replied "carry on the siding with armed force if necessary."

Complete census returns give the population of India as 294,000,000 an increase in the last decade of 7,000,000. Deducing the population of the Baluchistan, Shaastaks, Hills and Sikkim territory, enumerated for the first time, a net increase is shown of only 1.4 per cent., which is due to improved census methods. Thus, the population is for the first time stationary. Owing to two famines, mortality from disease and a great decline in the birth rate, the native states show excessive declines.

A despatch from India tells in a dozen words the terrible tragedy that has been wrought by famine. The census just completed in the worst districts shows a decrease in the population of more than 1,100,000.
